

Lorne Scots Colors Will Cost Reg't \$13,785

A ceremony for the presentation of the Lorne Scots (Peel, Dufferin and Halton) Regiment's new colors will take place at 12:30 p.m. at the home of Mrs. J. Turbou, 1217 St. Charles St., on Thursday, March 14.

The new colors, valued at \$13,785, will be presented to the regiment by the Ontario Farm Safety Council. The colors will be presented by a representative of Her Majesty on October 12 at Calton, in conjunction with the 100th anniversary of the regiment's formation in 1863.

The Lorne Scots, which was formed as the 4th Battalion of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in 1863, has a long and distinguished history. It has served in many campaigns and has earned a reputation for gallantry and courage.

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Game Warden

Wants Open Season on Deer

"Halton County badly needs a deer hunting season," Robert Reid, county game warden and conservation officer, said the province had been asking for a "deer season" now for seven years, but the county has been refusing it.

As a result, the deer population was up to 4,000, nature was "out of balance" and disease was rampant among the underfed animals struggling to find enough "browse" grounds.

Fruit-Trees Nibbled
The deer were nibbling on the fresh green shoots of fruit trees and, swarming over the highways in an effort to find enough food, the game warden said.

Since last fall, 18 had been killed on county roads and highways. Three had recently been killed on the O.E.W. road.

May Infect Cattle
He warned there was danger of the deer infecting domestic stock with their droppings and other contacts.

Reid advocated a two-day annual deer hunt at the beginning of the northern season.

Farmers Complain
He explained many farmers were against it because in the past hunters had cut their fences, trampled their fields and blocked roads with their cars.

"Also, the real hunter had blazed away at a cow or a horse instead of a deer."

Area Fruit, Vegetable Growers Study Soil, Use of Fertilizer

Recently 48 growers came to learn the complexities of soil management and fertilizer use. Palmer Hall was chosen as a central meeting place for this conference of fruit and vegetable growers in the Toronto - Hamilton area.

Subjects covered ranged from the background of soil development from the ice ages to the present. Soil classification was outlined and tied in with land use planning. Special emphasis was given to the soil types found in this area.

Farm Safety Fifth Place

The Halton Farm Safety Council was awarded fifth place in the Provincial Slide Competition sponsored by the Ontario Farm Safety Council. The competition was open to each Safety Council from counties and districts in Ontario.

Each entry consisted of five slides, showing accident prevention or accident hazards on farms.

The presentation of prizes took place at the recent convention of the Ontario Farm Safety Council held in Guelph. Mac Spruell, chairman of the Halton Farm Safety Council, accepted on behalf of the Halton Farm Safety Council.

Haltions entry was selected from a county competition sponsored during 1962. The county winner was Mrs. A. B. Coulter, R.R. 1, Campbellville, and her slides were submitted as the Halton entry.

Jacklighting Illegal
"Jacklighting" the hunting of deer by night by spotlight is not only illegal, but unsportsmanlike. The light mesmerizes the deer while often all the hunter sees is two eyes in the night. Two years ago a fine thoroughbred was shot in the county at night by a jacklighter.

Most Deer North
Reid said the biggest herds of deer were in Nassagaweya township, but deer roamed all over the county and were particularly plentiful up and down the banks of 12 Mile and 16 Mile Creeks.

Another 4,000 deer roamed Wellington County and the animals passed back and forth freely.

For maximum safety for humans, Reid suggest a short season allowing the use of shot-gun only would be best.

It was illegal to hunt with anything higher than a .275 calibre gun in the county, he said.

Anyone found with a .30 or .308 which can kill from a mile and a half up to two miles respectively was assumed to be hunting deer and charged.

A .22 rifle with the long cartridges are dangerous up to a mile. This is the rifle most used against deer.

Reid said there was an "open season" 365 days of the year on poachers using illegal weapons.
