Exchange Members

Visits New 4-H Club Project

J. R. Racine, president of the Canadian Council on 4-H Clubs, today officially announced another first in National 4-H Club activities. The new project, a special event in the 30th anniversary year celebrations, is to be known as "Interprovincial 4-H Exchange."

It will be conducted between July 9 and July 23 when a total of 50 4-H members, nine from each of 10 provinces, will be visiting a province other than his own.

June Kingston of Palermo is Halton's delegate. She will visit Newfoundland.

The Royal Bank of Canada, a long-term member of the Canadian Council on 4-H Clubs, will assume the costs of travelling expenses of the delegates to their first established destination within a province and return. Provincial 4-H administrators have now elected the delegates and will assume host duties to visiting delegates during the exchange period.

Classroom on Record

All delegates are between 16 and 22 years of age and were chosen on the basis of records of 4-H activities, education, public speaking abilities, participation in community activities, leadership ability, and individual personality.

Commenting on the new program, 4-H Council Manager James D. Moore stated, "Throughout its

history, 4-H Club work has become recognized, nationally and internationally, as a vehicle for bringing rural youth closer together for the purpose of bettering themselves individually and collectively in the fields of citizenship, agriculture and home economics. The Interprovincial Exchange Program will provide still another opportunity for Canadian 4-H Club members to "learn to do by doing," this time on a far reaching and very practical level — learning by observing 4-H programs in neighboring provinces."

In the provinces, visiting delegates will be assigned to host families. These families will, in turn, show their guests points of interest and take them to local 4-H and agricultural events.

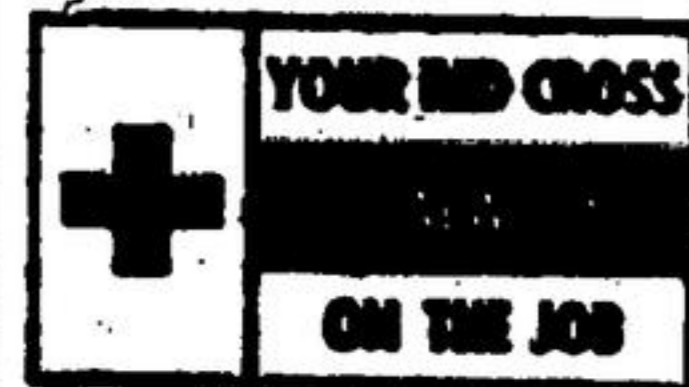
Mr. Gartley Talks Turkey
