Mrs. Peter Sayers Dies at 97 Was Acton's Oldest Resident

Acton's oldest resident, Mrs. Peter Sayers, died at her home, 107 Church St. E., on Thursday, March 14. She was in her 98th year. Requiem Mass was sung at St. Joseph's Church on Monday, March 18, by Rev. V. J. Morgan, and interment was in Dublin cemetery. Pallbearers were Frank Gibbons, Lawrence Gibbons, Henry Dewart, the Marzo, Irlu Marzo and Jack MacPherson. She had been in good health for her age, but had been failing since January. Born in 1866 in Dublin, she came to Acton in 1886, she was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Gibbons who were of Irish descent. In 1904 the former Jennie Gibbons married Peter Sayers, a lumberman in the Nassagaweya area. The couple moved to Guelph in 1916 but returned the following year when Mr. Sayers started a lumber mill. He operated the mill in the Nassagaweya district until the time of his death. A daughter, Jean, passed away about 35 years ago. Mrs. David Hutcheon of Vancouver is a stepdaughter. Mrs. Sayers attended St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church when she was able to be out and was formerly active in ladies work. She was always fond of cooking, sewing and reading. Many Changes She saw many changes in this district during her lifetime. When she was young, walking was the way to get anywhere. Living with her was Miss Irene Mulholland and her niece, registered nurse Miss Madeline Gibbons, took care of her devotedly every day. Nephews are Neil and Tom Gibbons of Acton and Frank Gibbons of Guelph. Three step grandchildren, Paul Sayers, Mrs. Minnie Ellis and Mrs. Dorothy Hearn, all of Toronto, and nephews Jack and Oliver MacPherson of Toronto were among those attending the funeral.

Mayor George V. Barbeau tendered his official resignation to council Tuesday evening. He has received a promotion with his employers, the A. P. Green Fire Brick Co., and assumes the position of production manager of the Weston and Acton plants. He felt he would not have sufficient time to continue as mayor. His resignation was accepted with regret. Mr. Barbeau came to Acton in August in 1950 as plant manager and with his wife, Thelma, son Brian and daughter Gail, moved to the home they purchased on Arthur St. two days before Christmas the same year. The mayor's interest in Acton has been kept since he first came here. He was delighted by the friendly way people in Acton accepted outsiders, after moving from Weston.

Mayor's Resignation Letter

March 18, 1963
Clerk Administrator and Members of Council,
Corporation of the Town of Acton,
Gentlemen:
It is with regret that I must ask you to consider this communication as my notice of resignation as Mayor of the Town of Acton, effective March 31st, 1963.
My status with the A. P. Green Fire Brick Company Limited has changed considerably, in that Mr. W. G. Tynan, President and General Manager, has appointed me Production Manager of our Head plant in Weston as well as our Acton operation. This change was prompted by the retirement of Mr. W. A. Smith, Vice President, in charge of production. May I assure you that many hours of deliberation had been spent before the conclusion was reached that I should resign. Acton cannot afford to have a Mayor whose interests would prevent him from giving the maximum of time and effort, nor would my conscience permit me to carry on under those circumstances.
Eventually, my family and myself will be leaving Acton, and I assure you that many fond recollections of my association with those I have served on various Councils, Boards and Committees will accompany me.
May I, in closing, extend to each of you the best of success in your Municipal endeavours.

Accept H.S. Boundary Changes Ballinfad Residents Object

Board, told county councillors no revision in the boundaries had been necessary while the boards co-operated. He noted Georgetown decided the students in the Ballinfad area would go to Georgetown while Acton had permitted the students on the check line to continue at Georgetown.
"If the change in boundaries is not permitted now, Acton will be compelled to take the students on the check line to Acton," Col. Brown noted.
He suggested students in the Ballinfad area have attended Acton High School since 1948-49 with the exception of last year when Georgetown required them to attend that school.
Reeve A. Phillips of Oakville wondered if a child located on a boundary would have a choice of school. Col. Brown suggested that would depend on the good sense of the Boards. "I feel the Boards would agree to a reasonable choice," he suggested.
Reford Gardhouse, past chairman of the Milton District High School Board, noted his board had agreed to the redistribution resolution although it was with some reservations. He suggested the Milton district was losing some pupils and not gain-

ing new ones, which made it difficult to broaden the base of subjects to be offered in the Milton school.
"We hate to give up something and not pick up something to reduce our per pupil cost," Mr. Gardhouse concluded.
During consideration by county council, Warden C. A. Martin suggested the matter should receive more study and perhaps the approval of the Minister of Education before the next meeting at which action could be taken.
Reeve H. Hinton, Acton, pressed for a vote on the resolution, that was tabled and it was approved.

Rev. Nutma Leaves

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\$3,722.55 Credit Received From Ontario Hydro For '62

Acton Hydro Electric Commission at their regular meeting last week received Ontario Hydro's 13th power bill. The bill gave the local commission a credit of \$3,722.55 and a cheque for that amount was enclosed. The thirteenth bill adjusts the actual cost of power used by Acton Hydro to the amount the commission is charged during the year on the basis of estimated costs.
A letter from the H.E.P.C. notified the Commission that regulations governing service installations in private homes now have been revised. It will no longer be permissible to install smaller than a 100 amp service, with a minimum of 20 circuits.
Commissioners decided to advertise the services available this year in co-operation with Ontario Hydro. Accounts totalling \$26,805 were authorized for payment.

NEW LONG DISTANCE BILL FOR YOU!

A new long distance billing procedure known as "MARK SENSING" will be introduced to our customers in Guelph, Acton, Arthur, Elora, Fergus, and Rockwood.
With this procedure, our customers will receive a new more complete form of long distance statement. The new form will list the date of the call, the place called, the charges for the call as at present; and, in addition, the telephone number called. This applies on calls placed station to station and person to person from your own number; other types of calls—collect, credit card, Zenith and third party calls will be listed on the statement with their particulars.
This new system introduces a change on the part of our operators' methods. Instead of writing the details of the call on a ticket, they will now mark business machine cards with special graphite pencils. These cards are then processed through machines that "read" the marks and subsequently produce the statement.
This new procedure will be introduced gradually so it may be a few months before you receive this new statement.
You will be interested to know that although there is added efficiency from this method, there will be no reduction in staff as a result.
