Woman Loses Life Helping Hurt Dog

A Stewarttown woman was struck and killed by a car last Thursday night as she comforted her family dog, hit a few minutes earlier by another car. The dog recovered.

Knelt in Road
Knelling in the middle of the road to help the temporarily paralyzed pet, Miss Elsie Cash, 50, was struck by a car driven by Howson Ruddell, 32, of R.R. 2, Georgetown.

Miss Cash saw the dog Nicky, but by a car which failed to stop, as she walked down the hill after babysitting for a neighbor. She ran into the home of her brother Ronald Cash, the owner of the dog. Then she dashed into the road to help the pet.

Ruddell was travelling north Police said he braked and skidded but they said the woman jumped in the wrong direction, into the path of the car. She suffered head injuries and was dead on arrival at Georgetown District Memorial Hospital.

Police praised the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Brigade for its prompt arrival at the accident.

Miss Cash lived with her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. William Hulls.

An inquest will be held.

Only two hours later, another accident occurred on the same hill but no one was injured.

Provincial Constable A. E. Miles of the Milton detachment investigated both accidents.

Stewarttown residents are incensed by the traffic hazards on the steep, curving hill at the point where the fatality occurred.

"I've seen kiddies come so close to being hit by cars and trucks that it almost makes you sick," said Mrs. George Atkinson, who resides nearby. "You need really steady nerves to live on that hill."

"I am a member of the Esquering Women's Institute," she continued. "We have tried many times to have Stewarttown designated as a built-up area and the speed limit enforced, but the Esquering Public School Board invariably passes the buck to County Council."

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**Make Rabies Inoculation Mandatory
County Council Urges Governments**

Halton County Council will ask the federal and provincial governments to make inoculation of domestic animals against rabies mandatory. Meeting Tuesday the council adopted the recommendation of its agriculture and reform committee.

The recommendation urged the senior governments to assume the cost of providing the rabies vaccine.

The recommendation, adopted by council, includes provision for forwarding the suggestion to all counties in the province as well as the governments.

Council has recently been concerned with a suggestion that a shelter for stray dogs be constructed in conjunction with the Oakville Humane Society shelter, but this was not referred to the committee report.

**Outlines County Role
In Regional Planning**

"The County is a major element in this regional world in which we live," F. O. Pearson, of the Department of Municipal Affairs told members of Halton County Council on Tuesday.

He was stressing the role of the county in coordinating planning between the various municipalities within the county. He suggested the county take in planning might best be developed by first determining the needs of the various municipalities in county planning, building an inventory of existing regulations, and finally developing a "unity in standards."

Mr. Pearson explained the Association of Ontario Counties is planning a meeting of representatives of the participating counties to get the provincial attitude and take it back to the various counties.

Committee chairman Reeve H. H. Halton, asked county council members to indicate whether they wanted the county committee to continue further in developing the role of Halton county council in planning.

**25,000 Days of Work
In 21 Winter Weeks**

Sandy Best, Halton's Federal Conservative Candidate and former Member of Parliament, stated today that 21 municipal winter works projects have been assisted throughout Halton, in the towns of Burlington, Milton, and Oakville, during the 1962-63 winter season.

Dr. Best said that under this Government program, an estimated 400 jobs had been created, providing some 25,000 man-days of work. Total estimated cost of the projects was \$2,474,341, of which the Federal Government's share amounted to \$748,341.

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
