Brookville Hall Full Friday For Benefit Dance for Smalls

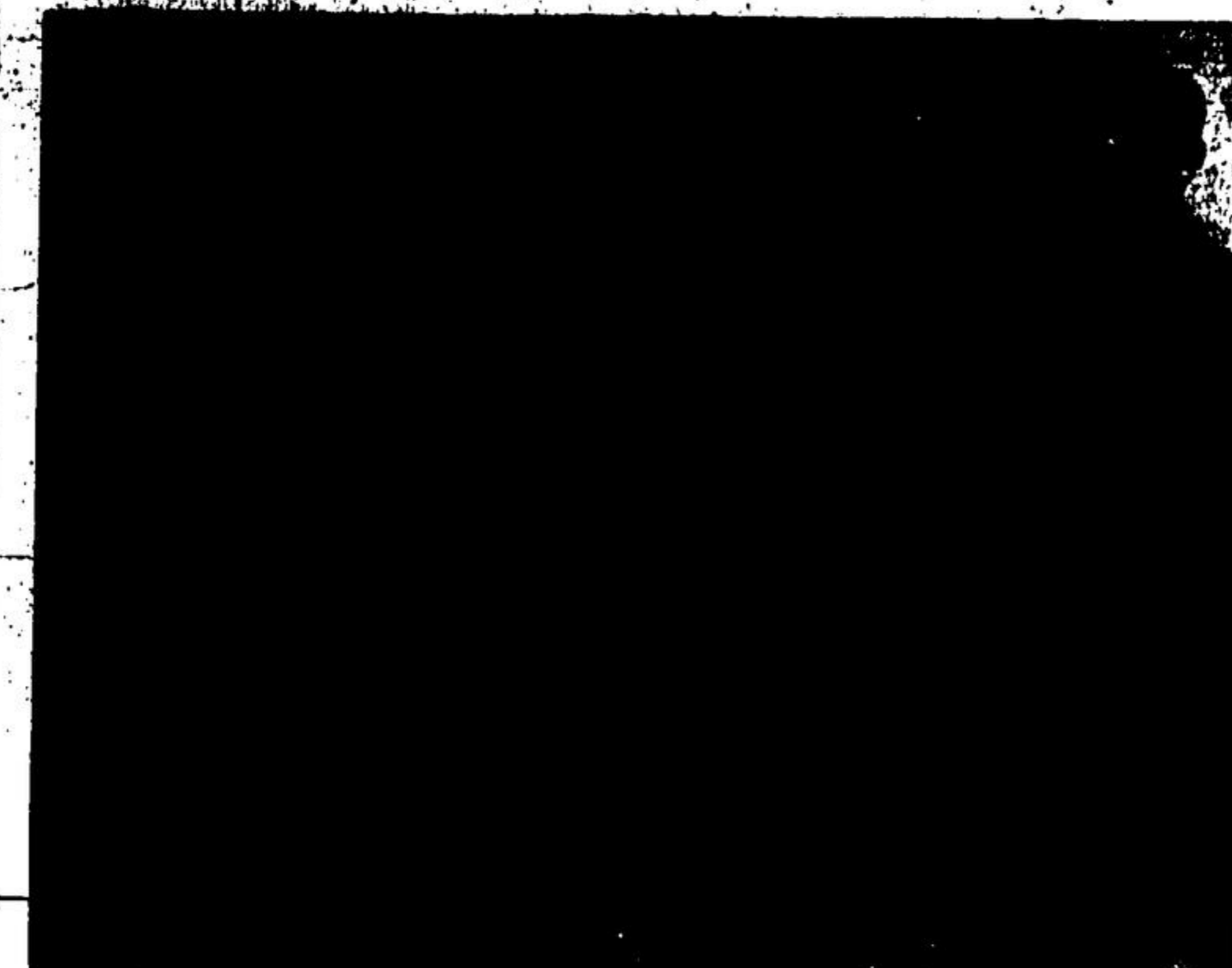

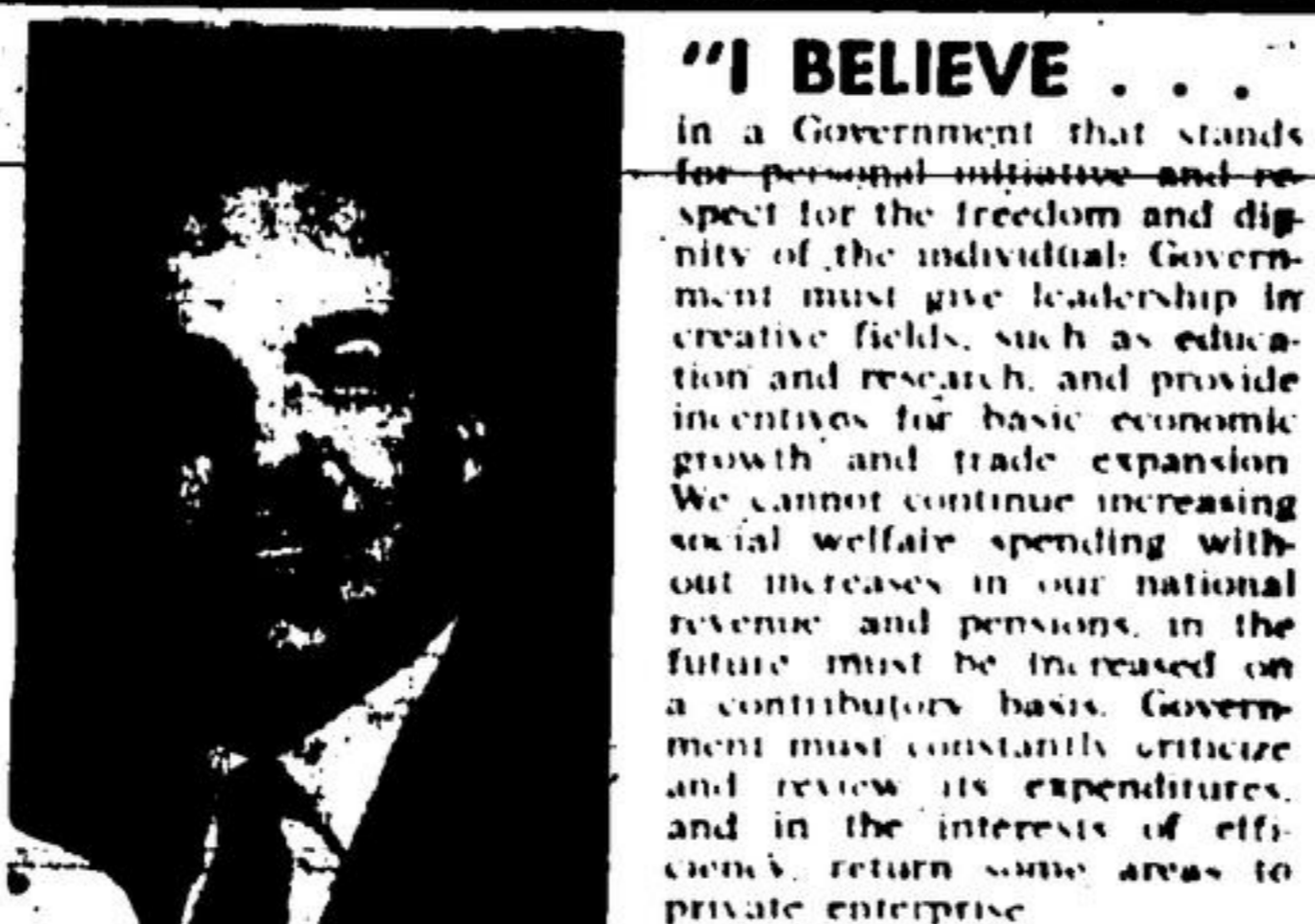
