Turn Down Chiropractic Coverage At Halton Co-Op Medical Annual

Inclusion of chiropractic coverage in the services for members was turned down by the general membership when the Halton Co-Operative Medical Services held its 16th annual meeting at Lowville United Church.

The Board of Directors had suggested the \$3 per adult premium could be paid out of the surplus, but members objected to lowering the Co-Op's reserves by \$3,000 and defeating the motion. A second motion designed to have members pay \$2 and take \$1 per adult member from the reserves was also defeated.

The annual meeting, attended by over 100, was described as "the best yet" and the defeat of the directors' recommendation on chiropractic coverage was another instance of how members control the operation of the Co-Op.

Mrs. Chester Service of R.R. 3, Milton, was named a director, replacing Willard Britton of Acton. The meeting re-appointed directors Mrs. Roy Wilson of Milton, Harold Biggar of Oakville and R. I. Davidson of Acton for three-year terms.

Directors whose terms expire in 1963 are Miss Florence Meares of Burlington, William R. Hume of Milton, Ross Segsworth of Burlington and J. Norman Bird of Georgetown. The terms of president Sam R. Fennie of Hornby, George Robertson of Acton, Albert Hunter of Norwalk and Arthur B. Harris of Campbellville, expire in 1964.

Special guests at the meeting were former M.P. Dr. Sandy Wilson, M.P. Dr. Harry Harley, Wilson M. Cogg, chairman of the Co-Op Medical Services, Federation of Ontario, Ted Schofield, Provincial Secretary of Medical Co-Op's, executive members of the neighboring Wellington Co-Operative, President Clarence McGee of Wentworth Co-Op and Max Morrow of Hamilton, representing the Ontario Hospital Services Commission.

Mr. Schofield outlined the principles of a Co-Op organization and explained a Co-Op is not only as good as its members make it.

Secretary Mrs. A. R. Culler reported memberships have been gradually increasing every day since the Co-Op announced the additional comprehensive coverage, a plan covering in-hospital medical care and home care of the doctor calls. Her treasurer's report listed assets at \$42,073.
