RUSSIA, ROME AND THE COMMON MARKET -- THE APPROACHING CONFEDERACY

PSA. 83 - DAN. 11 REV. 17

The first significant break-through has taken place! In Touch-Stone No. 9 we remarked: - "Little does the world suspect that the Vatican will shortly betray the West and Join hands with the Kremtin!". About the same time the world was jolted by news of the unlooked-for meeting between Khrushchev's son-in-law and Pope John XXIII. The Russian visitor admitted to being an atheist, but explained that he was interested in "peace." This is a classic example of Russian duplicity. It is not "peace" that the Kremlin desires, but "piece" - the piece-meal take-over of the world by international communism - its avowed objective. Russia is the latterday "proud man" of Habakkuk's prophecy (2:5), who "neither keepeth at home . . . and cannot be satisfied, but gathereth unto himself all nations, and heapeth unto him all people . . . and Daniel adds "by PEACE shall destroy many" (8:25). It was precisely for this reason (the furtherance of world communism) that the atheistic Russian conferred with the occupant of the Papal Chair. In this apparently innocuous meeting, the spadework was commenced which will eventually result in the formation of the most despotic alliance which the world has ever seen (Han. 8:23-25).

Let us not feign righteous indignation at the very thought of the "Holy Catholic Church" allying herself with atheistic, imperialistic Communism. The pages of history have revealed only too clearly, that the Vatican is, itself, a ruthless imperialistic power, atheir professing the qualities of a lamb. (Indeed this very efficacteristic of the Papacy was predicted in Rev. 13:11 - "two horns (Pope & Emperor) like a LAMB" but "he spake as a DRAGON"). What tyrant has the Vatican failed to do business with in the past? As we have already pointed out, in our own century the Vatican has signed Concordate with Mussolini (1929) and Hitler (1933). This was later followed by a Concordat with Franco Spain (1941)-while the bulk of the dictators were flourishing in Catholic Latin America. But then, this policy is openly acknowledged by the Church. From the "Catholic Herald" (1932) - "The Catholic Church is always prepared to come to terms with ANY GOVERNMENT IN THE WORLD - pagan, tyrannical, dictatorial, republican, imperial, monarchial, the CHURCH MAKES NO DISTINCTION. She is concerned solely for the souls of her children." Papal Rome once ruled the world - that baneful, bizarre period infamously known as "the Dark Ages" She aspires to regain the supreme power she once exercised. In view of her past dealings with political gangsters, she will not hesitate to embrace the Russian Bear to further her imperialistic ambitions. That she will certainly do so, is confirmed by the "sure word of prophecy"

For many years, students of Bible prophecy have anticl-

pated the "Treaty of Rome" (1987), better known as the Common Market. This was based on an understanding of Rev. 17612-18 - "And the ten horns . . . are ten kings . . . receive power as kings one hour (symbolic time) with the beast (Rome) ... For God hath put in their hearts to fulfill his will, and to AGREE, and give their kingdom (power) unto the beast . . . This prophecy commenced to become an accomplished fact in 1957 with the signing of the "Treaty of Rome", which signaled the revival of Roman Imperialism in Europe. The present "six" will soon be augmented by other countries on the west of Europe - but not Britain, who forms no part of the ten-horn confederacy - see Ezek W-13. Now this confederacy, under Rome, unites with Russia. It was revealed to the Prophet Daniel that the "King of the North" (i.e north of the Holy Land - the vast, sprawling, empire of Russia) would 'do honour to "a strange god" - "a god whom his fathers knew not shall be honour with gold, and silver, and with precious. " (11-18). This "strange bod" is the same "god" who the Apostle Paul forewarned would arise from apostate Christianity (2 Thess 2:3-12) - the Papal god - "our Lord God the Pope" Now the "fathers" of Communism (Mars & Lenin) did not "know" or recognize the Papacy They regarded it as a superstition, have and simple - "the opiom of the people". The present "fathers" of Communism, however, are engaged in a life-and-death struggle with the West. Thus they will do "honour" to a "strange god" whom their ideological fathers "knew not", in a calculated attempt_to-swing the Common Market into the Russian orbit. This they will succeed in doing and thus bring about a DRAMATIC SHIFT IN THE BALANCE OF POWER. This will clearly throw the West on the defensive as seen by the weak expostulation of the Tarchish (British & U.S.) Power Freetold in Ezek. 38:13 - "Art thou come (into the Middle East) to take a spoil ... to take a prev Russia, in her new-found confidence, is emboldened to seize Turket, and, as head of the Great Northern Confederacy, and with Germany as her chief ally (Eack, 38:2), swoops down into the Middle East and ARMAGEDDON (Rev. 16 16) This, God willing, will be our subject next month (May, 2nd). We will then consider "the end of the matter" (Dan. 7:28) - the last act of the Divine Drama, resulting in the glorious proclamation reverberating throughout the earth - "The kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our Lord and of his Christ: and He shall reign for ever and ever" (Rev. 11:15)
