### Returns Alfred Hales to Wellington South

Alfred Hales is the first man in the last 30 years to head the polls in Wellington (South) in four consecutive campaigns. He was re-elected Progressive Conservative member Monday after fighting off a serious threat by Liberal Ralph Dent, OAC professor. Mr. Hales' plurality was 738 over Prof. Dent.

The final count showed Hales with 11,116 votes, Dent 10,572, Harney (NDP) 6,149 and Yousif (Social Credit) with 142 votes.
