

WHEN THES FUZZY-CHEEKED scribbler was a nipper in knickerbockers he had an uhahaken belief in the hivincibility of the Acton Tanners, in those days one of the best intermediate backey teams in the province. Only one other team shared that pedestal the Toronto Maple Leafx.

In common with most of the other hove in town the only real acquaintance we had with the Leafs-was the pictures we got out of bubble gunt. They showed the stars of that era, fellows like Jue Primenti, Gordie Drillon, Charlie Conacher, Red Heron, King Clanev, Red Horner and George Hainsworth, against a hig white star back-

Then we timed in on Saturday nights, which really was bath night in those days (in a round gulvanized tub) to listen to Foster Hewitt describe the action at Maple Leaf Gardens. Television was only being dreamt of around then so our knowledge of the Leafs was scanty compared to what the kids know nowadays and are exposed to.

That didn't make us any less a fan. Like I said, I had two Idols - the Tanners and the Leufs.

One day the idea snapped into my mind that it'd be nice to see these two clubs play one another for the championship of the world. I asked my father if he thought he could arrange a series. His answer shook me up. If these two teams even met, he said in effect, It would be like murder incorporated and it would be the Acton team on the receiving end.

My world turned upside down - for almost a minute. Then my faith returned: With a sickly grin I throw the nauntlet right at my dad's foot with the words - "I don't believe it!" Nothing could shake my belief that the Acton team could be beaten in a fair series, even by the Toronto Maple Leafs.

THAT PARTICULAR BELIEF persisted until I reached the age into a 20 lead. But the visitors mediate backey. of reason. Then rather than think about it I shoved it back in some tied it up before the first 20 was musty cranny of the mind to be forgotten.

The NHL Old Times are a long way from being the players they were in their prime but they had no trouble disposing of the Tanners. They could score a goal almost as easily as the proverbial falling off a log: And "Long John" Henderson, never a real star when he was with the Boston Bruins, could stop pucks like no one I saw in intermediate backer except maybe Bob Bindernagel, once a Jim Casburn. star with Fergus Thistles.

Any one of the players on the NHL Old Timers could still step into intermediate hockey and be a scourge of the league. Fortunately few find it lucrative enough to bother.





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
