For the past two months there has been much activity in the greenhouses as plant growers seeded and transplanted vegetable and hedding plant seedlings. Many more of these tiny plants are now in cold frames to be come conditioned for the final move to field or garden in the next few weeks. The hardier plants such as lettuce now in the field will soon be followed by cole crops and finally, near mid-May, the tender plants such as tomatoes, melons and egoplants.

Many problems confront the plant 'grower. The greatest problem is the weather. 




