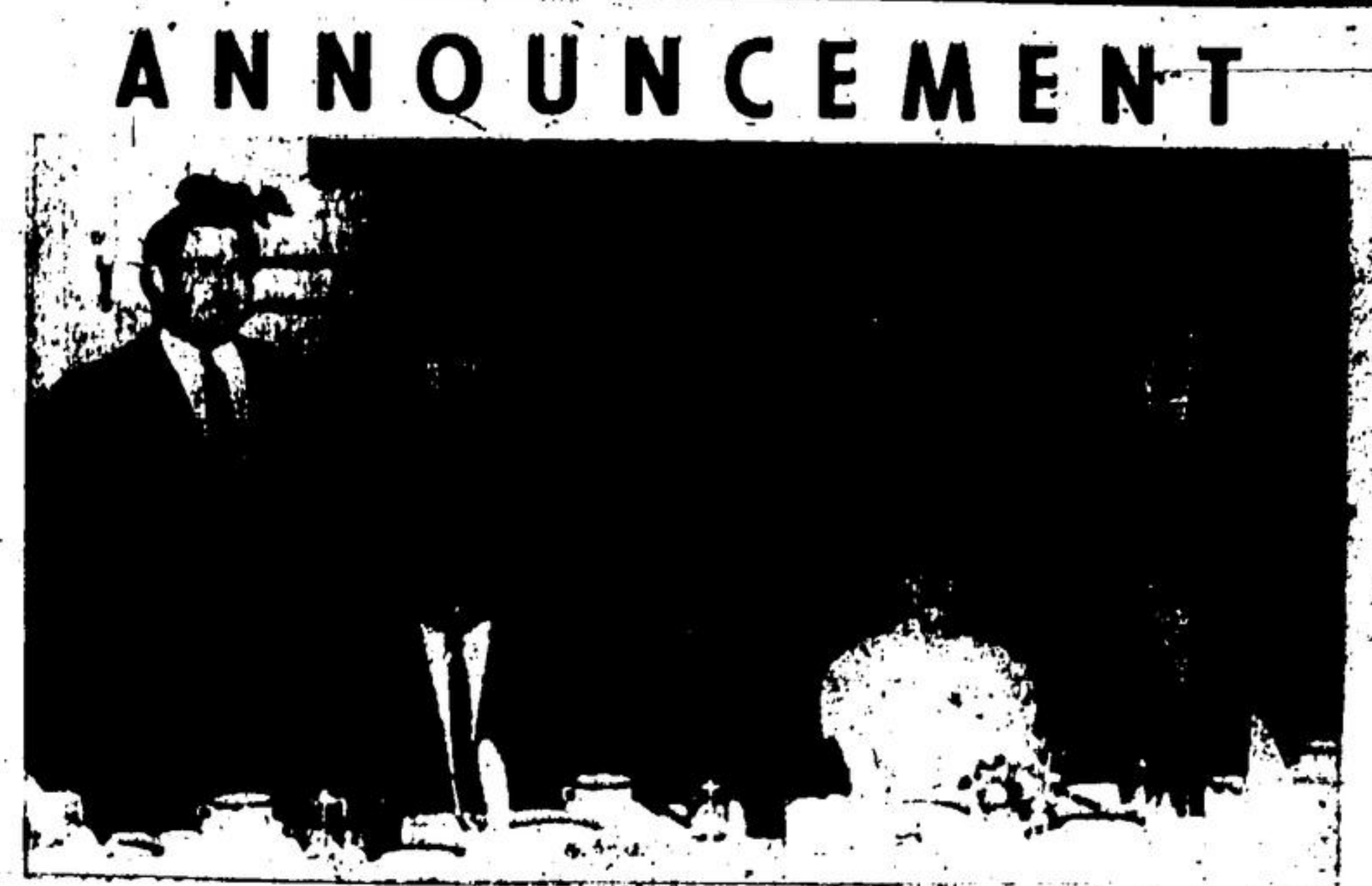
BRANCH MEET
