Man has forgotten he's still an animal, Mr. Harris began. He must eat and have fresh air to live.

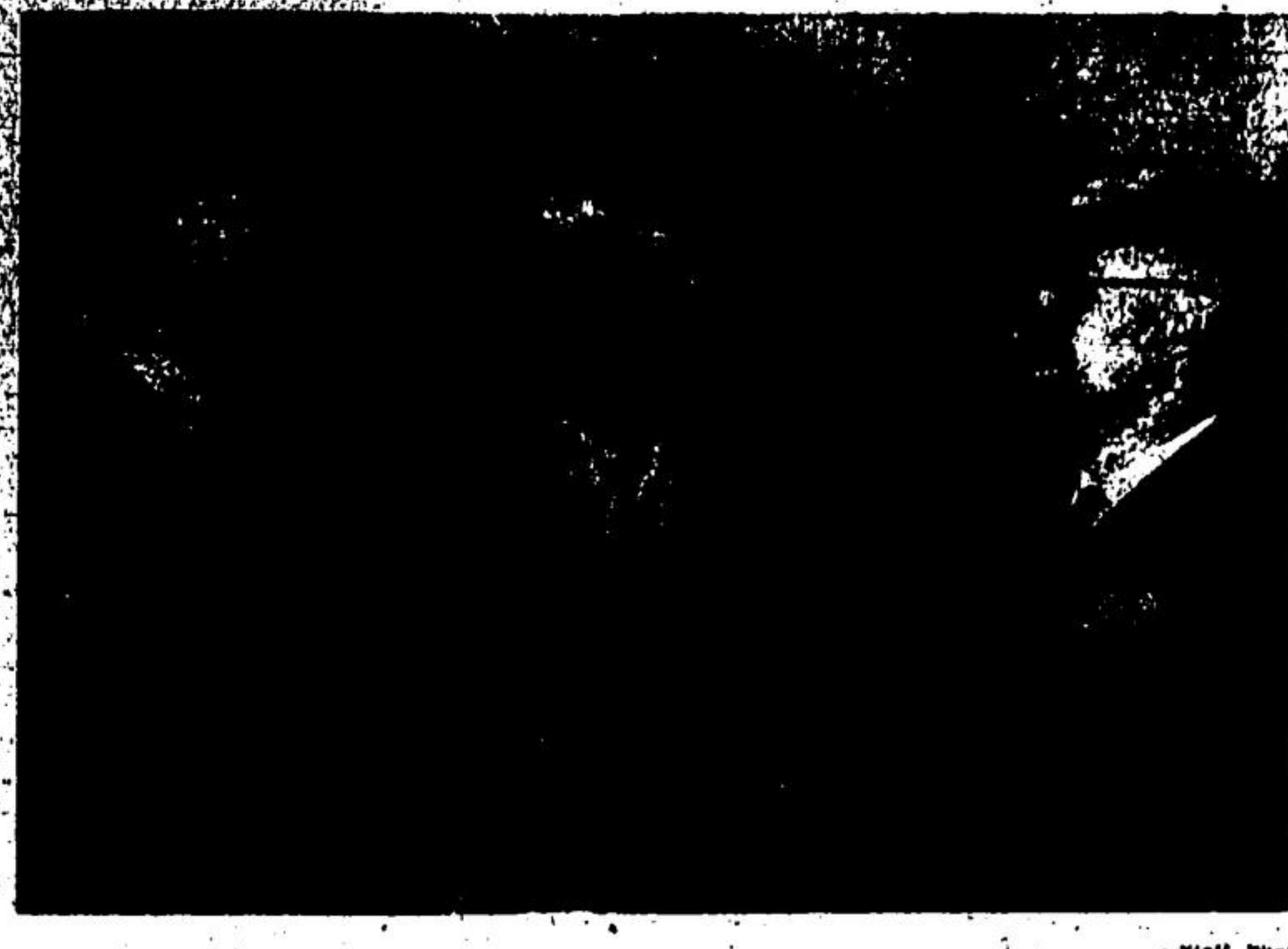
