Strange Machine Repairs Tracks

Lift, level and tamp, three dif-

ferent operations in one, is per-

formed by a peculiar-looking ma-

chine used by the Canadian Na-

tional Railway which is known

as a plasmatic.

A plasmatic has been sit-

ting on a flatcar on a siding near

the railway station for a few

days and Monday the operator,

Carl Osmond of Brampton, and

other mechanics started adjust-

ing the machine before the line

between Georgetown and Strat-

ford is started.

Mobile power is supplied by a

large diesel engine. As the ma-

chine moves over the rails, it au-

tomatically lifts low rails, levels

them to the proper degree and

then tamps ballast to maintain

this level.

The entire process is a one-man

operation and the operator's only

choke is to press the levers at the

proper time to start the tamping.

The machine is capable of do-

ing 20 rail lengths per hour. Each

rail tamping is done with large

claw-like steel spades which

move ballast under the ties which

hold the rails in place. A work

train hauling several carloads of

gravel runs ahead of the machine

spreading the ballast at each side

of the tracks.
