Funeral at Milton For D. G. McLellan

He was an elder of Knox Presbyterian Church, Acton, but had moved his membership to Rockwood Presbyterian Church. He was also on the board of managers at Knox here.

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Replace School Appliances Under Joint Hydro Agreement

Providing Ontario Hydro and Acton Hydro Electric Commission agree, electrical equipment in the home economics rooms at both the Robert Little public school and Acton District high school will be replaced this year.

During the commission meeting Thursday night of last week, members discussed briefly the new program adopted jointly by Acton Hydro and Ontario Hydro to replace equipment yearly. Decision is pending a meeting with representatives from Ontario Hydro.

Last year, Acton Hydro provided an automatic washer at the public school and Ontario Hydro, an automatic dryer. At the high school, Acton Hydro installed a refrigerator and standard washing machine, while Ontario Hydro provided an electric dryer.

This equipment is installed at no cost to either party under a program with manufacturers who provide the equipment at a reduced cost which is paid for from funds derived from the sale of the second-hand equipment. No cost is involved to either Acton or Ontario Hydro.

During the meeting, no decision was made to have representation at the electrical equipment display at Niagara Falls this week. Withheld until a later meeting was a decision whether to send a representative to the A.M.E.A.U. convention at Windsor, June 5, 6 and 7.

Accounts, totalling \$1,621.24 were approved for payment.
