

# Known as "Great White Father" Late Dr. George Darby Honored

(Special for last week)  
The church was filled on Sunday evening, May 5, when tributes were paid to the late Dr. George E. Darby in a special memorial service.

Rev. E. H. Hadcock introduced the two narrators, Mrs. Murray Mahon and Mrs. Malcolm Moffat, who gave highlights of Dr. Darby's early life. He was born in Nassagawey in 1889. At an early age, his family moved to New York State. He took part of his university training in Toronto before his family moved to Vancouver.

He was an ordained minister, as well as a medical doctor. He began his work at the then very primitive Methodist mission hospital at Bella Bella, B.C., in August, 1914. When war broke out, his first thought was to enlist. However, he was assured his place in the army could be more easily filled than that of a doctor for 200 miles of rough Pacific coast.

### Greatest Honor

In 1945, the Chinook Indian Tribe conferred the greatest honor on him when they made him a chief. His title was "Wo-Ya-La", meaning "The Great White Father". This was the name of the very interesting film of Dr. Darby's life which was shown.

Ebenezer choir sang "Sun of My Soul." Mrs. Horace Blyth led in a prayer of praise and thanksgiving.

The offering is to be sent to help carry on the work at Bella Bella, where Dr. Ian Chisholm is talking Dr. Darby's place. Miss Flora Moffat, formerly of Nassagawey, nursed under Dr. Darby for 15 years and is now assisting Dr. Chisholm.

Mr. Hadcock read a letter of appreciation from Mrs. Darby. Dr. George E. Darby died last September. At his request and the wishes of his Indian family, his ashes were taken to be interred at Bella Bella.

When the new church at Bella Bella, for which the Indians have already raised \$14,000, is completed, Dr. Darby's name will be memorialized in its name and his gravestone will be erected beside it.

The congregation appreciates Rev. Mr. Hadcock's efforts in arranging this service, inspiring us with the life story of this truly great, self-sacrificing missionary-doctor, the late Dr. George E. Darby.

## Halton TB Seal Drive Said Best in World

An Oakville woman, Mrs. E. E. Lunan, secretary of the Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association, has been chosen to attend the 17th International TB conference in Rome, Italy in September. Mrs. Lunan spearheaded the TB seal campaign in Halton County in 1962, described as the world's most successful T.B. seal campaign.

The announcement was made by Dr. C. W. L. James, executive secretary of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association, at the annual meeting of the Halton County Association in the Pine Room of the Oakville arena last week.

Receipts from the Halton County campaign for 1962 totaled \$34,074, approximately 31.9 per cent for every resident in the county. This figure is believed to be the highest in the world.

**Donations Up**  
Mrs. C. W. McKim, chairman of the Christmas Seal campaign, noted during her report that this year's donations increased 7.8 per cent despite the fact that the population of Halton County dropped approximately 6,800 from the previous year. She continued, the average per capita donation received in Halton County was 31.9 cents, the highest in Canada and the return per contributor of \$2.88 and the return per letter sent out of \$1.15 were all above the provincial average.

Dr. James, the guest speaker, told the members that the tools for diagnosing TB are excellent, but are no good if they are not used. Last year the number of TB cases in Ontario jumped 10 per cent and 20 per cent of

the population does not attend the TB clinics and this is the group with the highest incidence of active disease.

**Tribute to Officials**  
Outgoing president William J. Benson of Acton paid tribute to the executive of the association and to all the members of the board for their time which they gave freely throughout the year toward making the association effective.

Dr. Archie F. Bull, Medical Officer of Health and Director of the Halton County Health Unit, reported 23 new cases of Tuberculosis were discovered within the county this year, 13 by family physicians, four by clinics, four by surveys, one through Military Medical services and one by films at the National Employment agency. "It is becoming increasingly difficult to find new cases of tuberculosis and a tribute should be paid to the good work of the family physicians who discover the largest number," he said.

**Extend Program**  
Executive secretary Mrs. Lunan, in her report, stated "Halton County is indeed fortunate to have such a capable and interested Board of Directors, who give so willingly of their time to fight tuberculosis and now we are making plans to extend our program into the other fields of respiratory diseases.

Other reports were submitted by H. Brearley, chairman of the Health and Education Committee; audited report by John J. Kidd and Company; the social service and rehabilitation report given by Mrs. J. Rennie, the Association social worker and the report of the Medical Advisory Committee Chairman Dr. G. K. Phillips.

## Important Job Tips on Baby-Sitters

Does your baby sitter know what to do in case of fire or other emergency?

If you occasionally hire a baby-sitter, you should provide her with the telephone numbers she may need in case of an emergency, say members of Halton Fire Prevention Bureau.

She should have the telephone numbers of the fire department, police department, the family doctor and the phone where the parents may be reached. The Bureau offers these other suggestions:

**Know the Sitter**  
(1) Know the sitter. Be sure she is qualified for the job, has a sense of responsibility and likes children.  
(2) Introduce the sitter to your children and any pets and give her a brief period to get acquainted with them before you leave.  
(3) Make sure the sitter understands that in case of fire, she should get the children out of the house quickly, then call the fire department, then notify the parents—in that order.  
(4) Show the sitter two alternate means of escape from the house, should there be a fire.

(5) The sitter should be instructed to keep the children out of the kitchen, if possible, and to keep matches out of their reach.  
(6) See to it that the sitter has flashlights to use in case of power failure.  
(7) Tell the sitter when you are planning to return home and telephone her if you are delayed.  
(8) Make arrangements for seeing the sitter home.
