George Kerr Replies

Denies Claim Halton Money Used to Bribe Metro Voters

George Kerr, Progressive Conservative Candidate for Ontario legislature today denied the Liberal candidate's claim that money from Halton County is being used by the Provincial Government to bribe Metro voters into returning the Progressive Conservative Government to office.
Ewen W. Mullin, the Progressive Liberal candidate, had claimed that Metro Toronto is obtaining new welfare assistance, and has also criticized the subsidy for Toronto subways.
Mr. Kerr suggested that the only change in respect to welfare assistance for Metro Toronto was that the financing of this assistance in the future would be consolidated.
Whole Area
The accounts, Mr. Kerr said, would be submitted for the whole Metro area by the Metropolitan Council rather than by the numerous local municipalities.
The main idea was to assist in the efficiency of administration because of the nature of the Metropolitan area, Mr. Kerr said.
Administration of welfare systems would continue to be in the hands of the local municipalities, he added.
The amount of welfare assistance in Metro will not be increased, and certainly money will not be leaving Halton County for any new welfare assistance in Toronto," Mr. Kerr said.
He stated that close to \$635,000 was used for welfare assistance in Halton County last year.
Regarding subway subsidies, Mr. Kerr pointed out that this

legislation has only recently been introduced in the House. It will come under the Highway Improvement Act on the principle that the new line, which is being partially subsidized by the Province, will relieve congestion and reduce depreciation on surface routes and thus relieve the Province of part of its payments on road subsidies for Metro, he said.
Calling Metro's traffic problem unique, Mr. Kerr declared that the total grant for highways in the Metro area would not be affected by any other County in the Province.
Connect With 401
He said that a recent DHD survey showed eventual extension of the Queensway from Brantford to Guelph, and that this new artery would be connected with Highway 401 at Woodstock.
One can imagine the massive, heavily populated areas of Metropolitan Toronto, certainly some Provincial Assistance does not indicate bribery," Mr. Kerr said.
Halton municipalities will share \$750,000 of the Provincial Department of Highways expenditure on road construction and maintenance in the 1964-65 season, the Conservative Candidate said. Of this Equating Township will receive \$95,000 and Milton \$60,000.

Cross-Town Road

Mr. Kerr expressed surprise at Mr. Mullin's remarks regarding Burlington's commitment to spend almost \$1,000,000 in 1970 to buy land for a future cross-town road.
He suggested that one of the reasons this proposal was strongly recommended by Mr. Mullin was because the Provincial grants for the roadway's construction, and the eventual sale of land not needed by the Town, would result in a reduction of the cost of this land from \$415.00 to approximately \$300.00.
There was never any indication to Town Council that we should spend \$1,000,000.
