Board Officials Seek Expansion Export Sales of Soft Wheat Flour

Prospects for expanded sales in soft wheat flour in various parts of the world exist, members of the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board learned recently.

The prospects were outlined by Roy Cutler, Chairman of the marketing board and K. A. Standing, Secretary-Manager of the board, who recently interviewed Canadian Trade Commissioners from Central and South America, the Middle East, Europe and the United Kingdom attending the Second Trade Promotion Conference in Ottawa.

Mr. Standing said that subsidies provided by other exporting countries have a market effect on our ability to sell soft wheat flour, but it appears that we may still be capable of exporting to some overseas markets.

It was noted that many countries have recently developed a modern flour milling industry of their own and therefore their import requirements are in the form of wheat.

The Trade Commissioners interviewed strongly recommended that the Ontario producers engage in a more active export promotion program by publishing an information pamphlet on the supply, availability, price and quality of Ontario soft wheat. It was also recommended that samples be forwarded to trade commissionaires and other interested parties in foreign markets.

Accept \$25,892 Bid To Repair Kelso Dam

Seepage at the Kelso dam will be repaired this summer by the installation of two 30 by 30 foot concrete cutoff walls at either side of the dam, and the 16 Mile Creek Conservation Authority accepted a tender of \$25,892 for the work.

Two guest speakers demonstrated new products at the monthly meeting of Halton Mutual Aid Fire Services Association in Georgetown.

One firm demonstrated a new power blower that fastens onto a firefighter's back. A motor shoots air or water through a nozzle to blow out or drench a grass fire. The machine is capable of shooting a stream of air at 300 cubic feet per minute, or 250 miles per hour force.

A second guest spoke on plastics and demonstrated a new catalytic heater, which was later raffled at the meeting and won by a Georgetown firefighter.

Reeve Complains Museum Work Awaits Money

Acton Reeve H. H. Hinton objected about dirt and dust and the improved condition of the second floor of the Halton Museum at Kelso at the May meeting of County Council. But Oakville Deputy Reeve H. C. Meriv, chairman of the Museum Board, explained the work was held up for lack of money and because the Conservation Authority - owners of the Museum property - still had a workshop located in the building.

Mr. Meriv explained the Museum Board had a five year plan for the building, and while the first floor had been sandblasted and outfitted with museum displays, the second floor would have to wait until the money was available and the Conservation Authority moves to its own new workshop.

The board proposes to build a miniature village in the upstairs of the former Duff Alexander hardware shop and doctor house, he noted.

A. L. Marshall Active In Presbyterian Men

The May issue of the Presbyterian Record carried an article which was a source of pride to relatives and friends of Alfred Marshall. The story and accompanying photograph were in the column devoted to news of the Presbyterian Men's group. He is a brother of Earl Marshall of Acton.

"A familiar personality to men of central Canada is Alfred L. Marshall. His buoyant enthusiasm has inspired many throughout the five year history of the PM movement.

"Alf Marshall was born in the Limehouse district, north-west of Toronto, where he attended the Presbyterian church. During the first World War he served overseas and on his return worked in Detroit, Michigan. While there, Alf was president and leader of one of the city's largest men's Bible classes. When he moved to Toronto in 1927 he continued to serve the church by giving leadership to a teenage Bible class. Alf is now representative elder of Melrose Park Church. His wife, Anna and daughter Eileen are active in the Sunday School and W.M.S.

"At the first meeting of the East Toronto Presbytery PM Council Alf was elected president. Later he was named to the Toronto-Kingston Synod council of which he is now vice-president. Although retired from the post office department, Alf continues to work as an office clerk for the accounting firm of Mc Donald, Currie & Co in Toronto. He is fond of gardening, enjoys bowling and checkers in his leisure moments."

COMPOSERS' CONTEST Showing in Montreal For Area Sculptor

Milan, Italy has established an annual contest for aspiring composers, 40 years old or younger. The prize is a cheque in the lire equivalent of \$4,000 and a one night program at the Teatro alla Scala opera house.

Rockwood sculptor Yonel Drenters made his Montreal debut last week in the Galerie Dresdner with a sale of sculptures ranging from \$200 to \$2,500. He came to Canada in 1951 and began sculpting three years ago. He has exhibited in Toronto galleries and the O'Keefe Centre.

The first work was bought by Mrs. Walter Gordon, wife of the finance minister.

To Pay Farmer If Stock Shot

Legislation protecting the farmer from loss occasioned by the shooting of livestock by hunters, which was passed at the last session of the Legislature, has received Royal Assent and is now in force. Hon. William A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture, announced today.

Under the terms of the legislation, farmers may claim up to the market value of livestock proved to have been killed by hunters.

In order that the legislation may become effective immediately, agricultural representatives will act as valuers until other officials are appointed in the various counties.

The Act will be administered by the Ontario Livestock Commissioner. Claims by farmers under the legislation will be in the form of sworn affidavits.
