WIDOWS ALLOWANCES

New benefits for widows and single women, 60 to 64 years of age, are now available and applications are being accepted for grants up to \$65.00 per month with free medical service and hospital insurance.

This new welfare program will assist women who have reached their 60th birthday, with income less than \$1,140 yearly, and liquid assets of not more than \$1,000, resident at least one year in Ontario.

Women who may be eligible include: a widow, an unmarried woman, a married woman whose husband is in an institution, or who is divorced or has been described for more than 6 months.
