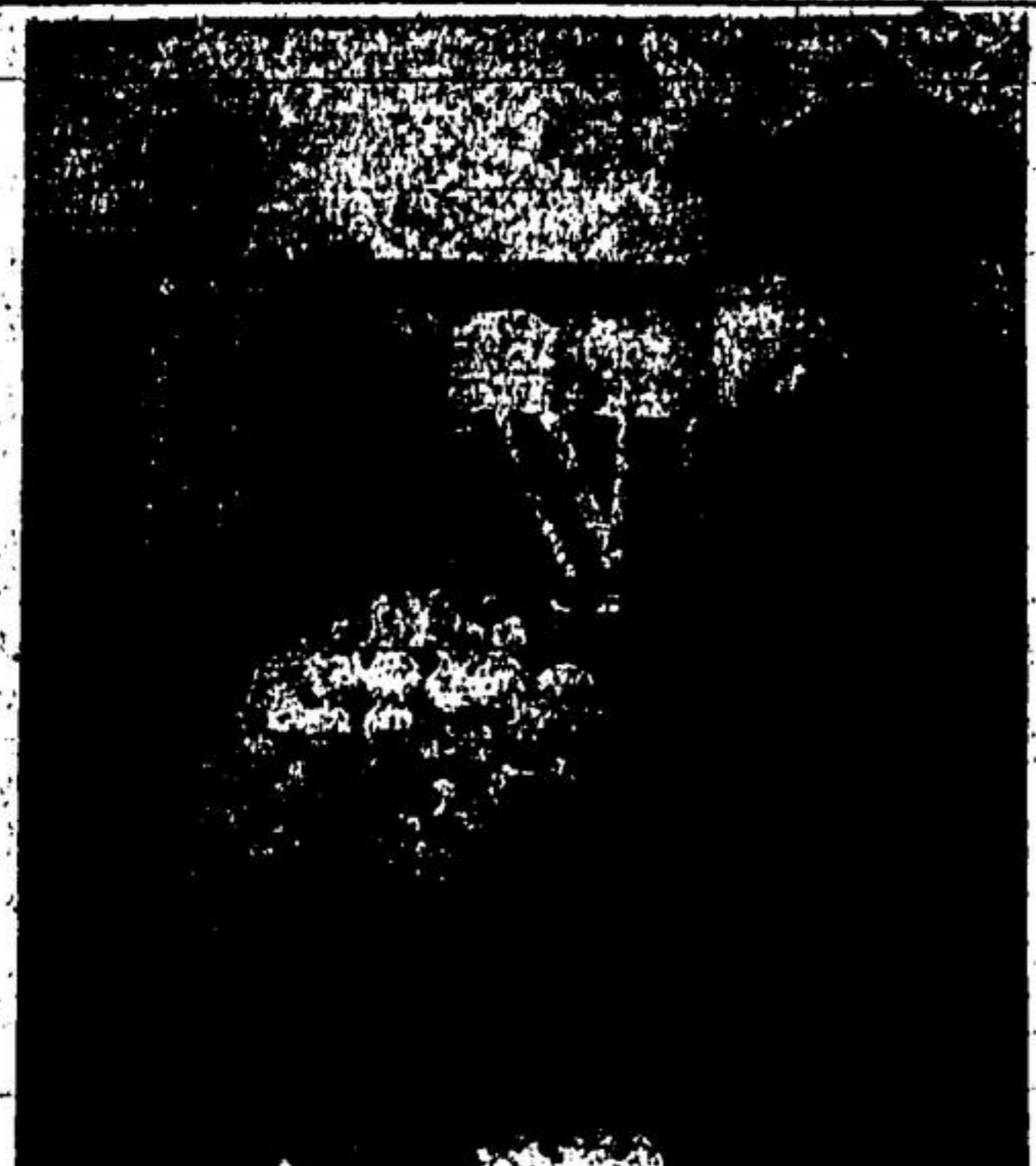

Loren Guild Dies Buried at Rockwood

A retired poultry breeder, Loren Julius Guild passed away at Branson hospital, Willowdale on June 1, 111th year.

He was born in Rockwood in 1896, went to public school there and later Cornell University. In the first world war he served in the Royal Flying Corps. Lately reading had been his main interest and he studied current events closely.

He was the son of Loren Guild and Jennie Jolliffe. He was married in 1923 and Mrs. Guild, the former Edna Laura Dunfield, survives him. They had moved two years ago from Rockwood to Gormley to live with their daughter, Mrs. D. C. Calder.

He was the first president of the former Rockwood Community Club and a board member of the Children's Aid Society of Wellington county.

Funeral service was held Tuesday afternoon at the Rumley-Shoemaker funeral home, conducted by his brother-in-law, Dr. G. S. Bell of Rockwood. Interment was in Rockwood cemetery.
