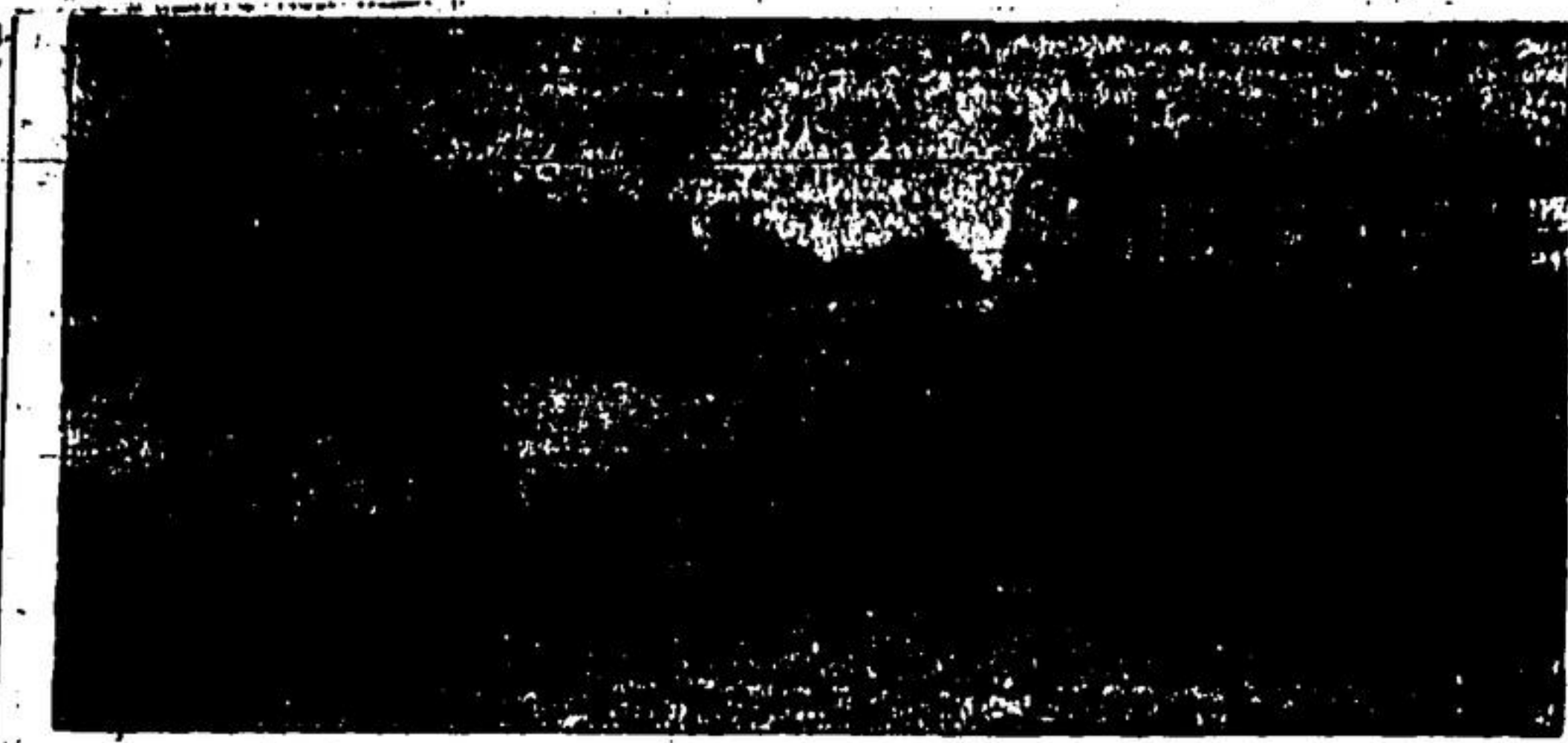

Cow Type Demonstration Given 4-H Calf Clubbers

Twenty-five members of the Acton 4-H Calf Club gathered at Cloverdale farm of A. J. Murray & Son for their first regular meeting of 1963 on Wednesday, May 29.

The business portion was chaired by president Russell Murray and secretary Murray Wallace called the roll.

The instruction period was conducted by Jack Robertson of the Extension Branch who gave a type demonstration of a mature Jersey cow to the junior members. The intermediate and senior members judged a class of heifers and a class of mature cows from the Cloverdale herd and several gave oral reasons for placing. Mr. Robertson acted as official judge.

Cattle Husbandry
The general meeting took the

form of an illustrated lecture in which Mr. Robertson explained with the use of charts, various aspects of cattle husbandry, such as inheritance, digestion and use of nutrients.

Separate work sheets were taken up by the three age groups with questions graded according to the experience of the members. This system is being used for the first time in the Halton County 4-H program.
