Industrial Vacations

Many Acton industries are battling the pre-holiday rush and are filling orders for supplies in preparation for their annual vacation periods.

Several of the factories will close down entirely with the exception of a skeleton maintenance staff while others are staggering their holiday periods by departments.

At the H. K. Porter plant, holidays will be taken by departments, one at a time, in order to keep the production line rolling.

The A. P. Green Firebrick Company will maintain a skeleton maintenance staff while the balance of the employees enjoy a holiday during the last week in July.

Blow Press plant employees will enjoy their vacation period from July 27 to August 12 but a skeleton crew will be on hand.

Tannery Schedule

Beardmore and Company employees spread their vacation period according to years of service from July 8 to July 22 but the plant will not be completely shut down.

Corona Shoe plant closes from July 22 to July 29. Michigan Bulb closes the last two weeks in July. Keates Organ company will not close down entirely but holidays will be staggered in order to keep abreast with current orders.

Micro Plastics employees

Micro Plastics employees will take their "vacation" period the last two weeks of July returning after the holiday weekend. A maintenance staff will be retained.

The Acton Free Press employees will stagger holidays in order to keep up production and publications. Superior Glove company will stagger holidays this year. Swims Sea Food plant will also stagger holiday periods.

Alax Engineering employees will have a two-week staggered holiday period but maintain a working crew in order to keep the production line operating. United Carr Fasteners plant closes July 22 until August 6.

Too busy, in summer, Acton Limestone Quarries Ltd. will not have a holiday period in the summer due to the volume of summer business but anticipate a holiday period in the slack winter months.

Comarc Ltd. are shutting down operation during the last two weeks of July and will reopen after the holiday.

Mason Knitting company will close its doors from July 12 to July 29 with the exception of a maintenance crew and shipping staff.

Other Industries will either shut down completely for the holiday vacation or stagger holidays in order to maintain a skeleton staff to keep production moving.

Museum Picnic Defies Weather

One Killed, Six Hurt In Two-Car Crash

One man was instantly killed and six others hospitalized Saturday following a two-car head-on crash on the seventh line north of Oakville. Dead is Albert Frederick Duggall of Oakville, lone occupant of a south-bound station wagon.

Hospitalized in Oakville-Traillgar Memorial hospital with injuries were six passengers in the north-bound vehicle. Suffering injuries were Phil Landry of Acton district, with face and leg lacerations; Fernis Rowland of Kitchener with possible rib fractures and possible broken spine; Addison Graves of Guelph, with a broken ankle and leg; Avery of Waterloo, with head lacerations; Raymond DeGroot of Aries was released after treatment for bruises. The six men were Ford Motor Company employees returning home after finishing work on the night shift.
