Direct Dialing to Guelph Area To Eliminate Toll Charges

Plans to eliminate long distance charges on telephone calls between Acton and Guelph in August, 1964, were announced by C. J. Catalano, Bell Telephone manager for this area, this week.

This means that calls between Acton and Guelph will be local calls, dialed direct by callers.

Present toll-free calling arrangements with Georgetown and Rockwood will be continued.

Because of the enlargement of the local calling area, higher monthly telephone service rates will become effective in Acton in August, 1964.

The new rates will be the same as those paid in exchanges which have a similar number of telephone lines within their local calling areas.

Classify Calls

Mr. Catalano explained that all exchanges served by the Bell are classified into rate groups according to the number of telephone lines within their local calling areas.

The groupings are based on the principle that the value of service to each telephone user tends to increase as the number of telephones he can reach without toll charges increases.

When the number of telephones within an exchange's local calling area increases or decreases to the point where it is within the scope of a higher or lower group, the rates for that group become applicable.

Increased Use

Mr. Catalano said that the decision to provide toll-free calling between Acton and Guelph was based on an increase in the community of personal and business interests between them as indicated by studies of long distance calling. It was revealed there were close to 3,000 calls made from Acton to Guelph during the survey.

He explained that the company maintains continuing studies of calling habits between neighboring exchanges between which toll charges exist.

If these studies reveal a sufficient flow of telephone traffic to indicate that the customers would be best served by the elimination of toll charges, steps are taken to remove them.

He said that many Acton customers will pay less per month under the new rates than they do now in monthly rates plus long distance charges on calls to Guelph.

List New Rates

Following are typical monthly telephone rates that will become effective in Acton coincident with the widening of the local calling area in August, 1964:

* Covers 75 outgoing calls per month. Each additional outgoing call costs five cents.

No More Coal At Beardmore's

After nearly 100 years of operation with coal-fired furnaces, Beardmore and Company plant is being converted to oil-fired units.

Scrapped are the former two coal-fired units and in the process of being manufactured are three new oil-fired units capable of supplying 60,000 pounds of steam per hour at 100 pounds pressure.

Boiler room alterations have been underway for the past two months. The wooden trestle bridge was removed two weeks ago and the C.N.R. spur line for coal cars is being removed.

Foundations are being poured to handle the new units and a steel beam installed in the boiler room. Washrooms and other facilities will be installed before the job is completed.

Tannery engineer Guy Ross anticipates the renovated boiler room will be "second to none" in the area. The three boilers will be tied into the one main stack.
