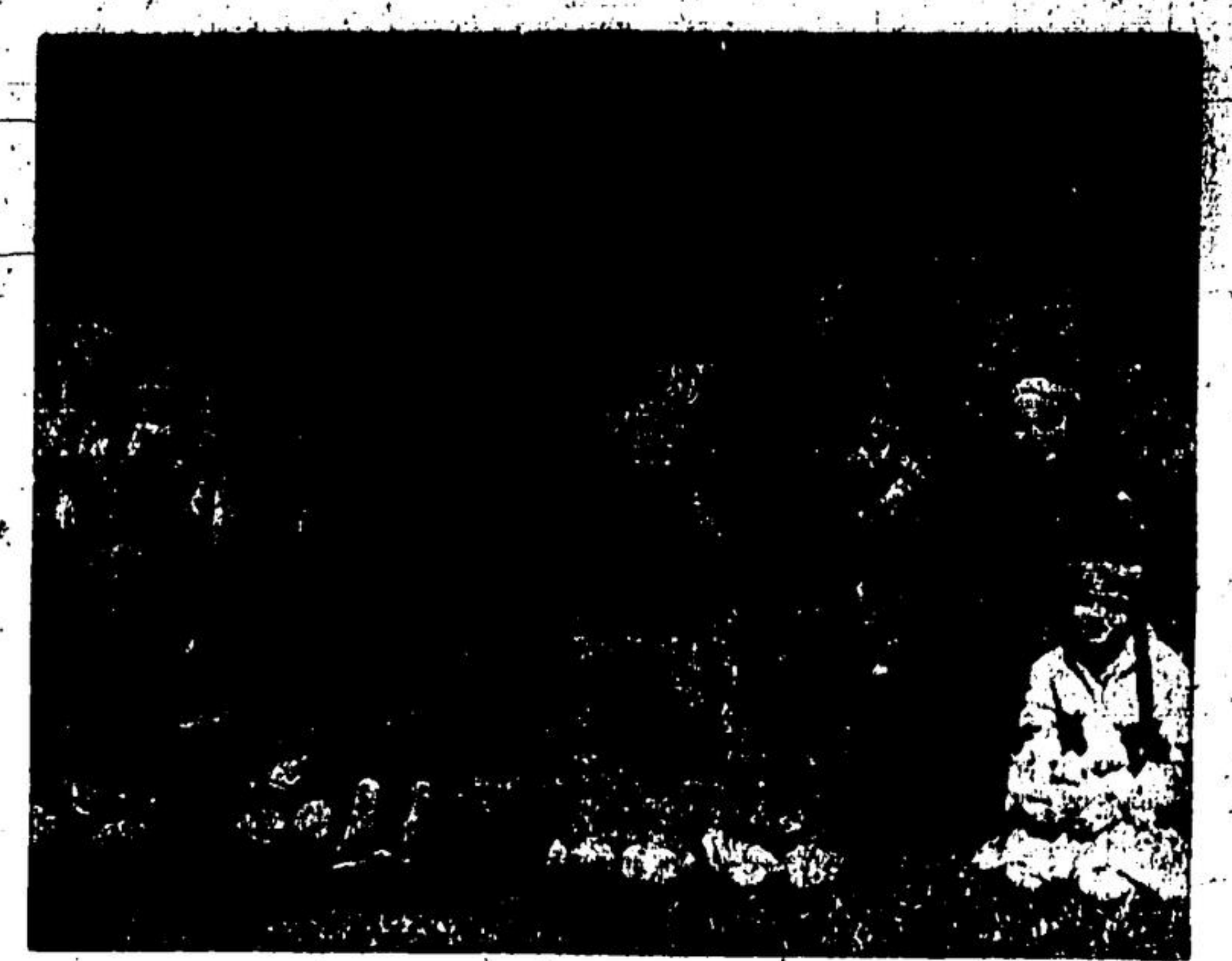
Mr. Duby explained it is quite difficult to control rubbish-burning when industrial and commercial refuse is not picked up by the town workmen but dumped there privately under contract. He also pointed out that fires in the area are not necessarily caused by the people dumping but papers are ignited by smoldering fires burning under the garbage.
