A church hayride for 21 young Guelph United Church members turned into a near-tragedy Saturday evening, when their tractor and hay wagon tipped over and plunged down an embankment on 30 Sideroad near the Fifth Line, west of Acton.

Tractor driver Gerald Blom, 16, of R.R. 1, Rockwood was pinned under the tractor and received a broken back. He and Walter Smith, 19, Donna Smith, 17, and Judy Weandel, 17, all of Guelph, were taken to Guelph General Hospital for treatment. The latter three all received lacerations and bruises.

North Halton O.P.P. investigated. The tractor veered off the road, into the ditch and tumbled down a cliff, throwing all 21 occupants of the wagon to the ground, they said. All the youths and girls were from the Dublin United Church in Guelph.

Need Department OK To Strengthen Bridge

Approval of the Department of Highways will have to be sought, before a bridge on the Tenth Line can be strengthened enough to carry heavy gravel trucks, Esquering councillors decided Monday.

Charles Armstrong of Armstrong Brothers Construction approached council, asking two 30 inch piers be installed at the bridge to make it strong enough to carry tandem dump trucks. The trucks are too heavy for the bridge load limit. But council decided that the D.H.C. would have to be approached to allow strengthening.
