## Fencing Session In Esquesing

"We'll have to call in the fence-viewers," said Elmer George Leslie when Bill Cahoon of Limehouse appeared before Esquesing Township Council, last week, protesting that his neighbors weren't complying with the fence by-law.

Mr. Cahoon told Council that he had fenced his property, but his neighbors had not. "My cattle are getting out all over the place!" he complained. "I've fenced my land for eight years. I don't feel like fencing theirs, too."

"The by-law states that adjoining properties are to be fenced on a 50-50 basis," commented Councillor George Currie. "You will have to fill out the forms and send one to each of the three fence-viewers and your neighbors," Reeve Leslie added. "I'll do that first thing in the morning," said Mr. Cahoon.

Borrow for School

Esquesing Council passed a by-law authorizing the borrowing of money for the new Pineview public school at Ashgrove, to be built in Township school area No. 1. The loan will be made by way of temporary advances pending the issue and sale of debentures. The debenture issue is \$40,000. The Township agreed to borrow the money from the Can

adian Imperial Bank of Commerce as an interest free loan exceeding 6% per annum.

Fifteen letters of appreciation for the purchase of the new Esquesing Township Building were read by Township Secretary K. C. Lindsay.

Council authorized a \$10,000 payment to Fred Hamilton for a fox he killed.

The collector was asked to institute proceedings against William Cook, who moved a house into the township without a building permit, that did not comply with the zoning by-law. He appeared before council last week and refused to move or destroy the \$1,200 house as they suggested.
