Buy Road Roller
Following demonstrations of two types of road rollers, council agreed to purchase a Baxter machine at a cost of \$1,572. Members think the purchase of the roller will save the town money on contracts to repair sidewalks as the town workmen would be equipped to do the work.

Acton firefighters will receive an additional \$1,000 Workmen's Compensation coverage, Tuesday evening the amount of coverage was increased from \$5,000 to \$6,000.

Councilor Hamilton Peal in reporting for No. 2 committee stated the Fire Underwriters wondered what might happen in the event of a major fire if Beardmore and Co. were allowed use of the underground reservoir and the Churchill water supply of water at the town water tank ran short.

Clark Jack McGeachie assured council that water from the Main Street well and a well in Warren Grove would supply 100 gals. of water per minute. Councilor Alec Johnson said "For firefighting purposes firefighters can still draw water from the pond."
