Get \$3,346 for School Short Mortgage Funds

A grand total of \$3,346.38 was collected over the past two months, in the North Halton Association for Retarded Children's annual campaign for funds for the Hornby district Sunshine School, president G. G. Addison announced today.

"This will see us through for this year, but it won't do much toward reducing the \$5,000 mortgage on the new school," he commented. The Association originally launched a direct mail campaign throughout North Halton to collect \$4,000 for school operating costs, and \$5,000 to clear off the mortgage outstanding since the school's opening last fall.

Mr. Addison pointed out the school is partially financed by government and municipal grants, but the majority of funds must come from service clubs and individual residents in the Georgetown-Acton-Milton area. At present, the school has 16 pupils supervised by two full-time teachers and four part-time assistants.

"Some of the money collected in the campaign will have to be used to cut down the mortgage," the president explained.

Although the campaign is officially over, contributions will still be accepted at any time. They may be mailed to the Association at Box 671, Milton.
