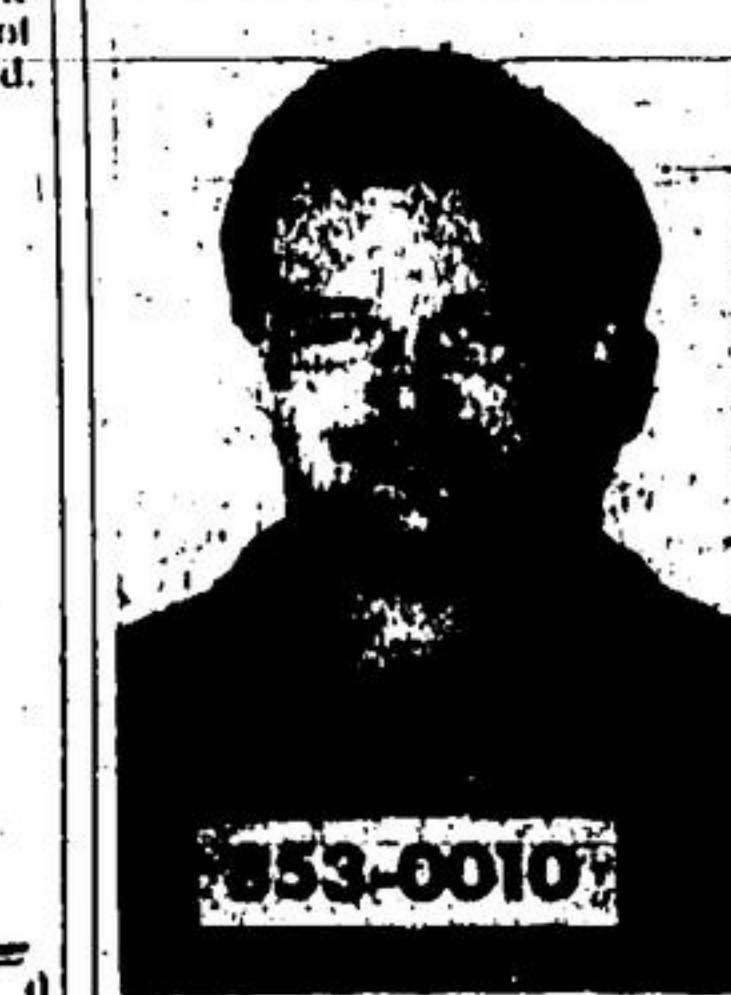
Churchill Well Proves Worth

The recent dry spell was a thorough test for the Churchill water well. In spite of an all-time high of 43,000 gallons being used in one day, the water level remains high. From January to May the average flow of water at the well was 200,000 gallons per day. Since June 1 to July 16, the average water flow has been 43,000 gallons per day. If we had been using the well since the spring, it might have been drained dry by now, stressed clerk Jack McGeachie.
