

## Council Hears Board Request Discusses Need for 11 Rooms

Councillor Eric Johnston wondered if it was possible to stagger classes at the high school even if it meant starting classes at 8 a.m. in order to save off a building program at present.

**\$200,000 Debt**  
After Councillor Wood explained the present debenture debt secured by the town, chairman Jack Reid expressed his sympathy to council and said "300,000 debenture debt for education alone is something fantastic."

Mayor Doby questioned whether the Ontario Municipal Board would approve another debenture issue for the proposed addition in view of the present debenture debt. Mr. Reid said "They will probably say you have been out in the sun too long."

During a round-table discussion on the mill rate increase if the proposed addition materialized, figures varied from six to nine mills.

Mr. Lowe was of the opinion the percentage of students who complete their education is "pitifully small."

**More Vocational Training**  
He wondered if some arrangement could be made to provide more vocational training for the ones who don't handle the academic subject. Councillor Wood expressed his disappointment that more Acton students were not able to enroll at the vocational school recently completed in Georgetown.

Reeve H. H. Hinton stated Acton has no demands on the Georgetown school. "It's a case of if they have room for Acton students they can enroll," he said.

Councillor Johnston was of the opinion the Acton school board should pressure the Georgetown board into taking some of the Acton students unable to digest the academic studies.

**Need Patience**  
Mayor Doby stressed the importance of both the board and council being patient with each other regarding the proposed addition and studying the problem carefully. "There is one undeniable fact: There are more children coming out of public school than can be accommodated in high school. Money to expand is the big problem," stated Mr. Reid.

School board members agreed to submit in writing a complete report regarding the proposed addition to council to study the problem intelligently with council members from Baconessing and Nassagaweya townships.

**Recommended by 1964**  
Mr. Reid asked council to consider the urgency of the addition as staff inspectors had recommended completion of the addition by the fall of 1964. "We have to move fast if this is to be done," he said.

Councillor Wood wondered why a second gymnasium was being recommended in view of the fact the M. Z. Bennett public school has an enrolment of around 400 pupils and there isn't a gym at the school. Mr. Reid stated "I am not sold on the fact we have to have another gymnasium. If the department is not going to pay a just share, I am willing to say we can do without it."

In conclusion the mayor stated "We will require every bit of information we can get as this looks as though it is more than the ratepayers can handle."
