

Approve Kelso Filter, Will Develop More Roads

Several improvements to the Kelso Conservation Area in the north and west end of the changehouse and west of the parking lot, to keep the filter for the swimming pools, acquisition of a residence for the superintendent, and development of more roads through the park site — were approved by members of the 16 Mile Creek Conservation Authority last week.

The sand filter was deemed necessary to clear up the murkiness of the water in the swimming pool. Officials pointed out the water was A-1 as far as health was concerned, but presented a safety problem because lifeguards cannot see the bottom of the pool.

The murkiness is caused by the turbidity of the water flowing into the pool from the Kelso Lake, nearby. Cost of the filter, which will be built by Authority workmen, is estimated at between \$3,000 and \$5,000.

The Authority also ordered the installation of a half metre diving board at the deep end of the pool.

Superintendent Residence
Park superintendent Y. Kangas will be given quarters in the Duff Alexander farmhouse, the Authority decided, when it was explained the superintendent should be at the property at all times. The portion of the house to be used, is leased to the Halton County Museum Board but that board is not yet ready to use it.

CORRECT TURNS
A large number of drivers habitually make incorrect left turns — turning directly into the curb lane, instead of into the passing lane. Incorrect right turns — directly into the passing lane — are less numerous, but more dangerous. It is very simple to learn correct road positioning when making turns, the Ontario Safety League points out to drivers who are uncertain about turning maneuvers. Why not find out exactly how it should be done? It could mean the difference between safety and collision one day.

hurried atmosphere at the end of the year for presentation early in the year. Taxes could then be collected, in more and smaller instalments, earlier, which should have its effect of lowering the borrowing costs of the town.

Without a staggered term of office there is a possibility of a lack of continuity during the election of a new council at the end of the two-year term. It would still be an advantage to the system that at the end of the two years the whole council could be turned out of office at once, if it proved unsatisfactory, rather than having to do it piecemeal over a two year period if terms of office are staggered.
