

# Milton All-Stars to Face Galt Terriers

Halton County All-Stars will meet a mighty opponent in the form of the Galt Terriers of Milton Sunday, August 11.

It took four hours for representatives from Georgetown, Oakville, Campbellville and Milton to pick the 27 Halton All-Stars at a meeting at the home of secretary Len Ste. Marie Tuesday night. No representatives were present from Hamilton or Dundas.

When they were finished the task even Len Andrews, manager of the All Stars, was pleased. Galt Terriers, a club sprinkled with Americans and a power in the senior baseball circuit, will find they have their hands full with the Halton stars.

In last year's All Star contest the Halton Club edged Guelph Royals, 7-4.

**Add for Andrews**  
To help him with the coaching end Len Andrews, Campbellville's answer to Casey Stengel, has Ian Shepherd of Oakville, Murray Lake of Hamilton and Cliff Houston of Milton.

The entire Campbellville pitching staff, most feared in the league, won positions on the first All-Star team. Southpaw Gary Fields leads that contingent with 10-0 win, no loss record, followed by veteran Jack Roberts, another pitcher, with a seven-win, one loss record. Harry Hamilton, a righthander with a three-win, no loss record, rounds out the pitching staff.

Should this trio run into difficulty with the hard-hitting Terriers, Larry St. Louis and Gary Hughes of Oakville and Pete Ewing and Howie McMillan of Hamilton will be around to offer assistance. McMillan perhaps expected since he incurred an arm injury over the weekend.

On the receiving end Tom Byers, a veteran of the Nickel Belt league with Oakville Oaks the past two seasons will again don the catcher's garb. Hamilton's Doug Hyatt of Milton Red Sox, a .304 hitter, will be ready to step into Byers' position in the event of injury.

**Calms to Clout**  
At first base, the return of Campbellville's Earl Cairns to an All-Star uniform, will add that home run touch. Earl is hitting at a .370 clip and has struck out only once in 89 times at bat. Second base has been nailed down by Hamilton Cardinals' personable Joe Januzzi. His play at the keystone has attracted the most favorable comment this season. He's hitting over .300 as well.

Stu King, Campbellville's smooth fielding shortstop, has taken over that position from Ron Campaigne of Oakville. Stu is another handy Andy at bat with a .366 average.

Third base has been assigned to Ross Dryden of Oakville. Ross's .356 batting average has sparked the Oaks since the early part of the season.

rolling the centre garden. Doug also adds a big bat. He has a .326 average. He'll be flanked on either side by fence-busting Al Wingerow (.357) of Campbellville whose exploits at the plate need not be mentioned and hard-hitting Don McPhail of Dundas.

Second string outfielders are Bill Elliott (.358) of Campbellville, Jim Wilson, Dundas and Bunker Lawrence, Oakville.

Every team in the Halton circuit placed a representative on the All-Star squad, except Georgetown Giants, who failed to catch a berth.

Manager Len Andrews, recipient of some criticism in other All-Star games for not using all the players dressed mentioned to the Tuesday meeting that the idea of the game is to win, not to play everybody. And Len will need his wits about him when the All-Stars meet the Terriers.

**Galt Lineup**  
Galt has a fine pitching staff headed by Ross Paton who flings from the port side, righthander Dennis Erickson, southpaw Eric Lomax and Ken Lavis and righthanders John Clark, Ray Buckland and Hank Todd. All are senior-intercounty veterans and considered behind Brantford's Ron Stead tops in the senior circuit.

Catcher is American import Pat Lutz, first base is held down by Ron Boomer while Murray Oliver, hockey-playing Boston Bruin, is at second base. Ron Smith plays shortstop. Ray Upper third.

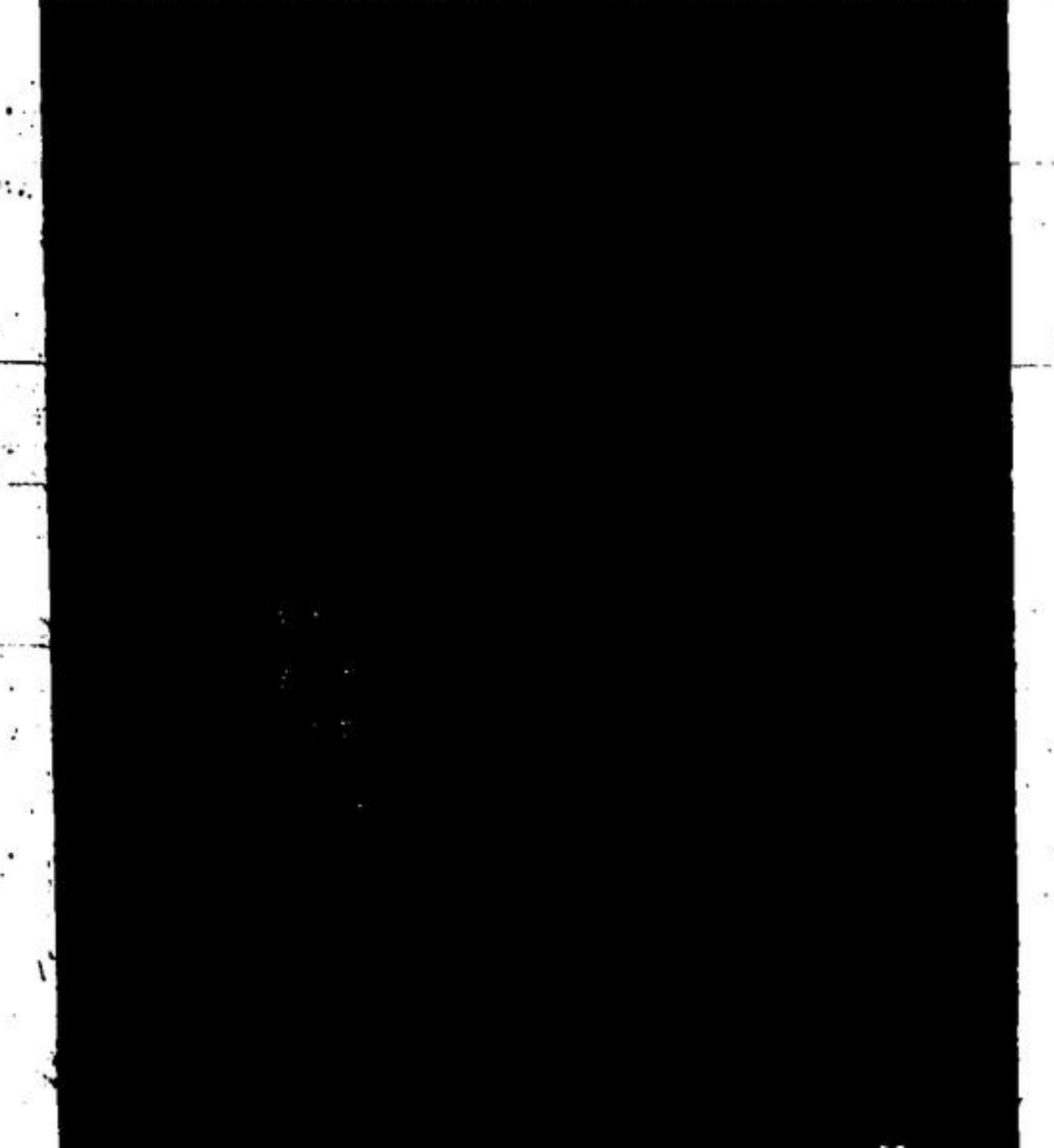

**Install Sand Filter at Kelso Reduce Swim Pool Turbidity**

Work will begin next week on the installation of a sand filter at the Kelso swimming pool. Dave Murray, field officer for the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority, told the Champion this week. The filter will be installed in an attempt to cut down on the turbidity of the water in the pool, which has of late caused concern.

Mr. Murray said the filter would be approximately \$4,000 and would be installed by the Conservation Authority's own staff. The installation will take about two weeks.

The filter is being installed now so that the Authority will know how effective it will be for next year. The filter will be installed adjacent to the pool and will not affect the scheduled swimming programs.
