

Wintermeyer Tours "Grass Roots" Monday Party Stops in Acton for Hasty Half Hour

A one-day handshake tour — a "grass roots" blitz — was conducted through Halton County's residential centres on Monday, by Ontario's Liberal Leader John Wintermeyer. Halton Liberal Party's provincial candidate Owen Mullin accompanied the opposition leader as they shook hands, lunched, dined and made speeches in Oakville, Georgetown, Acton, Milton, Bronte and Burlington.

During the day Mr. Wintermeyer shook thousands of outstretched hands of party stalwarts, municipal officials, children and followers of opposing parties.

Tirade Against Gov't. And throughout the day he continued a tirade against the "inefficient" Conservative government that has held the power in Ontario for the past 20 years.

Starting with an 8.30 a.m. breakfast in Oakville, the Liberal chieftain carried on the tour without a break until 6 p.m. when the schedule allowed him a two hour rest before the closing reception at the Brant Inn, Burlington.

Closed Mondays His visit to Acton was brief.

He sauntered from his car up deserted Willow St. to the town hall, arriving about 2 o'clock to be greeted by Mayor Les Doby, Reeve Bert Hinton and Deputy Reeve Bill Denny. Also in the group were Mel McCullough, the chairman of the Esqueping Liberal Association, Doug Fendley of Georgetown Liberals, Liberal candidate Owen Mullin of Burlington and R. R. Kosterksi of Burlington who arranged the tour and one curious child.

They posed on the town hall steps and answered questions for six reporters, who just missed outnumbering the people who were making the news.

Milton, Georgetown In other towns, the group met merchants and shoppers, but with Monday closing and summer doldrums Acton's main streets were silent except for the

group on their short walk. Mr. Wintermeyer was here only about half an hour and left for Milton where the stores were open and there were plenty of people to talk to. He had come here from Georgetown where he was taken to see the contentious ninth line where there had been two accidents within three days last week; he promised a Liberal government would improve the road at once.

At the morning press breakfast in Oakville, the Liberal Leader lashed out at the indecision of the present Ontario government, and pointed to the hesitancy of Premier Robarts to set a definite election date. September 26 was his only guess about a possible date.

"No Delays" He attacked the government's

delay in recommendations about old age pensions, and stalling the winter works aid program.

"There will be no delays" like this if a Liberal government is elected this fall, he pledged.

After the breakfast he went main streeting in Oakville and visited a shopping centre. In Georgetown, civic officials and businessmen held a luncheon where they grilled the Liberal chief about local problems. Then followed tours of Acton, Milton and Bronte before more mainstreeting in Burlington and the Brant Inn reception.

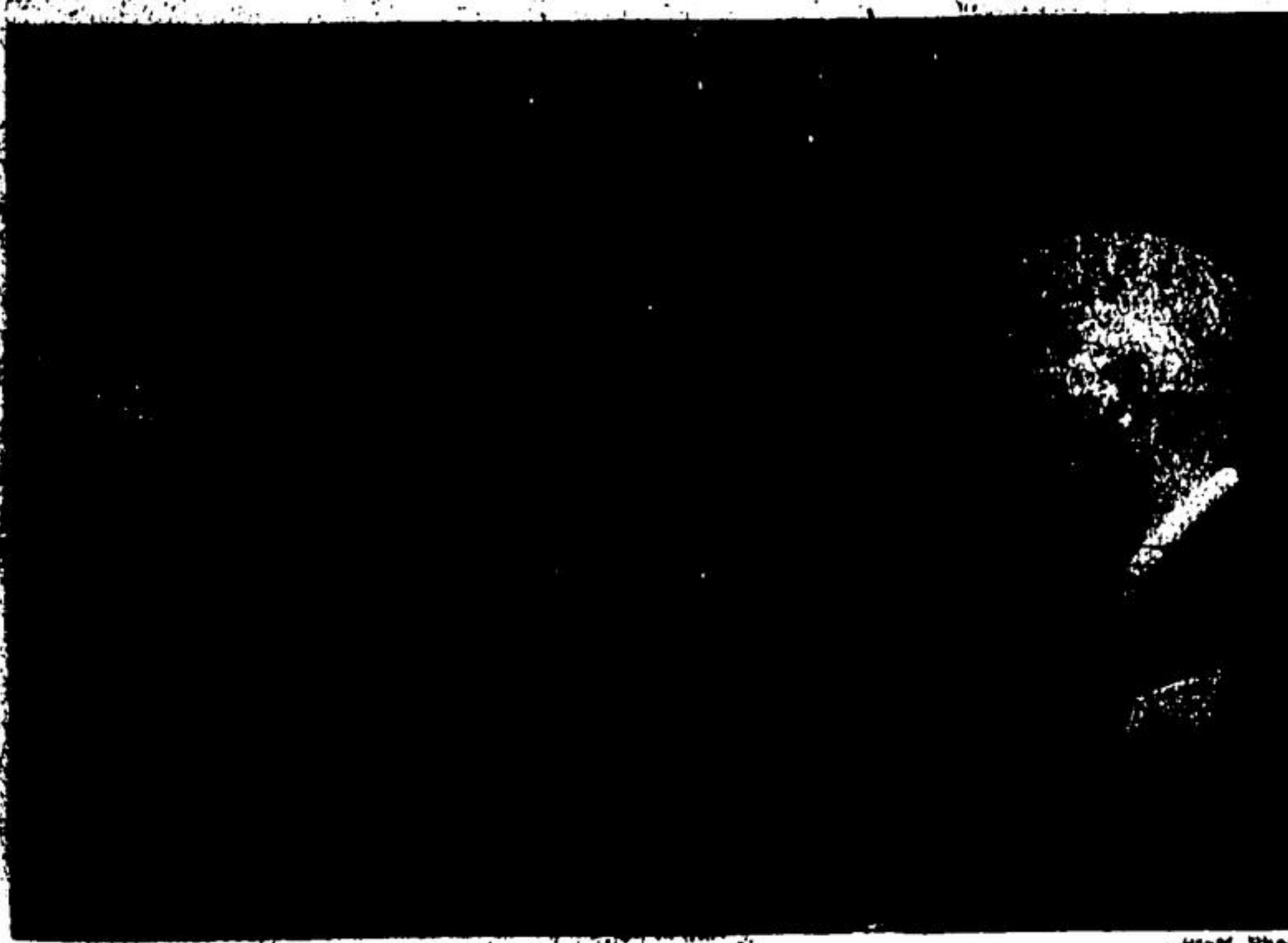
Owen Minister It was hinted, at the evening reception, that Owen Mullin could become minister of municipal affairs if he is elected and the Liberals can upset the Ro-

berts regime to form the next government. Mr. Wintermeyer suggested he didn't expect Mullin to enter the legislature as "a backbencher." Mr. Mullin, a former Burlington councillor who is presently Mayor of that town, co-chaired a recent Ontario Liberal committee of municipal affairs.

His day in Halton was one of several the party leader is spending touring Ontario ridings in an early campaign before the fall election.
