

20 Sideroad Site Confirmed By Board as School Location

The Eramosa Township School Board met at No. 2 school on August 14 with all members present, chairman Warren Parkinson, vice chairman William Jackson, trustees Dr. R. J. Hilton, Ross McDougall, and Murray Smeltzer. Also present were C. R. Whitfield, P.S.I., J. Grimson Sanitary Inspector representing Dr. Dale, and Mr. Krueschen of Dalbey & Krueschen, board architects.

The board received reports on the two sites chosen by the board for the new central school on No. 20 sideroad and No. 25 sideroad, both in the 4th con-

Sees Problems
Dr. Dale, M.O.H., in his report brought forward the possible mosquito problem and drainage problem at No. 20 sideroad. Commenting on No. 25 sideroad he mentioned the question of the safety school access which would have to be solved.

In the report of engineers engaged by the architects, it was noted that two holes were drilled at both sites to a depth of 15 feet. Both sub-soil conditions at both sites were similar and borings revealed excellent sub-soil conditions on both sites for

building support and for drainage.

After considerable discussion, the board made no change in its previous decision to build at 20 sideroad. Considerations given included the central location of the school, located a short distance off the 5th line, and along side a wooded area for weather protection.

Decisions made by the board at this meeting were to advertise in the Guelph Mercury and Guelph Guardian requesting tenders for the sale of No. 1 and No. 5 school properties.

To subscribe to 11 copies of Canadian Audubon for use in the schools.

To purchase from Walker Stores drapes for the grades 2 and 4 rooms at the Rockwood School and the Junior room at No. 11.

To place burglary insurance with Forsythe & Gerrie on a projector and two typewriters.

To purchase approximately 100 new pupils' desks for No. 3 school junior room No. 2 and junior room No. 11 and to purchase a chair and desk for the principal's office at No. 9 subject to recommendations of the principal and Trustee Hilton.

Transportation in the north part of the township was discussed with the bus operator, Fred Elliot. The board decided to exchange pupils between No. 2 and No. 7 on account of the heavy enrolment at No. 2. Grades 1, 2 and 3 will be taught at No. 2 and grades 4, 5 and 6 will be taught at No. 7.

The board authorized the bus to travel 25 sideroad to the 7th line, then north to 30 sideroad and back to the regular route.

Department Reports Findings On Mill St. Park Land Sale

Changes in the zoning and sale of lots presently designated as park land on Mill Street East were referred back to No. 1 Committee at Tuesday's Council meeting. The subject was opened by Councillor Irwin who had a copy of a letter from the Department of Municipal Affairs to a client who had objected to the rezoning and sale. As the clerk is away on vacation a very limited discussion was held. However, it was pointed out a change in the official plan had been approved but no action had been initiated by the town to have an amendment made to the zoning by-law.

Earlier the Free Press reported a copy of a petition signed by 53 ratepayers had been submitted to Council. The petition had been submitted to the Department of Municipal Affairs. A second petition, signed by 11 adjoining homeowners had been submitted to Acton Council and the Ontario Municipal Board.

Text of Letter
The text of the letter from the Department of Municipal Affairs follows.
July 19, 1963
Dear Sir:
Re: Town of Acton—Sale of Park Land Our File — T-147
Further to our letter of July 9, 1963, we are pleased to advise you of our findings concerning the sale of park land on Mill St. It appears from our files that

the parcel of land in question was dedicated as a public park when the plan of subdivision was registered. No doubt the municipality will establish its legal right to dispose of the land before it commences itself to its sale. We are not aware of any statutory requirement for the municipal council to sell park lands by public tender or to advertise the property for sale. Presumably the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs is not required under the provisions of what is now section 28(9) of The Planning Act because these and the corresponding provisions by which subdividers must now convey land to municipalities for public purposes had not been enacted at the time this plan for subdivisions was approved.

Any amendment to the zoning by-law would require the approval of the Municipal Board and the Board will insure that, before approval is given, the owners of adjacent properties are notified of the amendment and given an

opportunity to voice any objection they may have. Our records do not indicate that an application has been submitted to the Municipal Board as yet for appointing a by-law effecting this property.

Attractive coloring sheets will be distributed to all the public

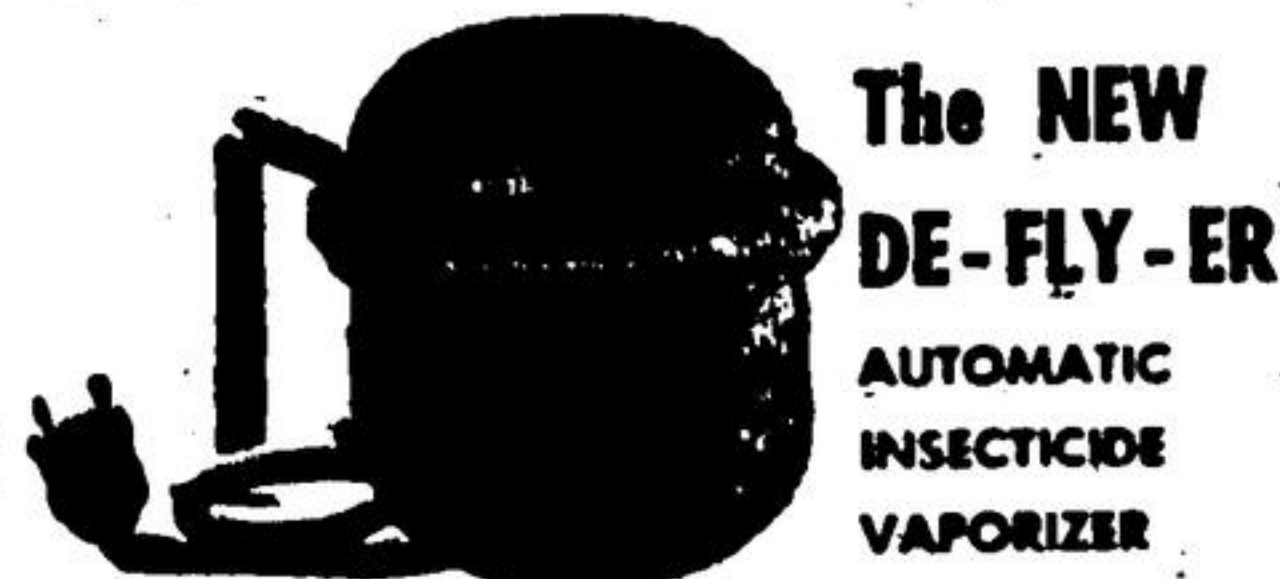
school students. Letters will be sent to parents. Large posters, four different kinds, will be placed in all public school classrooms. Instruction books go to the teachers, too.
