Accident Fund Pays \$4,200,000 Claims

TORONTO: A record of more than \$4,200,000 was paid to Ontario residents during the past year by the new Motor Vehicle Accident Claims Fund, Transport Minister James Auld reported today.

The fund's first year of operation ended on June 30 and during that time, it made payments on 2,417 claims for damages arising from traffic accidents.

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Mr. Auld reminded drivers the law requires that they must carry proof of insurance with them. Any motorist who cannot show police either a liability insurance certificate or proof of having paid the \$20 uninsured fee, is liable to a fine of \$30.

The latest super track to mushroom on the landscape is the multi-million dollar Mohawk Raceway, owned by The Jockey Club Limited, and set in 400 scenic acres at Campbellville.

Between the communications systems at Mohawk Raceway and the absence of such facilities at other tracks, before World War II there is even more difference than between today's mobile starting gate and the interminable false starts at yesterday's harness meetings.
