

Whose Medicare?

Gillies Hits at Old Parties

William D. Gillies, Halton candidate for the New Democratic Party in the September 23 provincial election, started his Milton area campaign Monday by issuing a challenge to "Old Party candidates."

Mr. Gillies, speaking to members of Milton area N.D.P. leaders group at the home of Mrs. G. Fraser of R.R. 6, Milton, challenged candidates Owen Mullin of the Liberal Party and George Kerr of Progressive Conservative Party, to "spell out their programs including the financing of Medicare in detail, so that the voters of Halton can truly decide who can most ably represent all the people of Halton."

Noting his party supports a foundation program of education and financing, the candidate stated that "the Conservatives have a record of standing in their half-way house which is strong in appeal but weak in content, when it comes to meeting the needs of the province."

"The Liberal Party," he continued, "is even more cov. Liberal Mullin wants to speak for Halton but he isn't telling Halton what, if anything, the Winter-Tanner Liberals are going to say."

Government Clinic to Encourage Industry

An export clinic for municipal officials and local industry in the Mid-western Ontario Economic Region will be held at Kitchener November 7.

The clinic, one of nine throughout the province, will deal with exports, municipal industrial development, regional development, manufacturing arrangements and branch plants. The purpose is to encourage increased export of Ontario-made goods and develop new manufacturing in the province.

A Holstein cow named Gilpat Pontiac Haven (G.P.), owned by McDonald Bros., R. R. 3, Georgetown, has completed a five year 2x record of 21,564 milk, 695 fat in 305 days; 24,324 milk, 780 fat in 365 days. Her three year 305 day record was 17,827 milk, 598 fat.

Limbourne Pasture Abbey Soverign, also owned by McDonald Bros., has completed an eight year 2x record of 21,214 milk, 893 fat, 4.21 per cent test in 305 days, 182,209 B.C.A. and 22,848 milk, 970 fat in 365 days. She has 102,479 milk, 4.4 per cent test, 4310 fat in six lactations.
