

Bounding the SPORTS BEAT

BOARDMORE'S U.P.W.A. TANNERS picked up a few players from the town league All Stars and a couple from Guelph Dairy Queen and almost succeeded in bringing home the bacon in the Hillsburgh softball tournament on Labor Day.

Horsby won the tourney by edging the Tanners 6-5 in the final game behind the pitching of Louis Bertanson and Joe Shaw.
