Tops in Junior Plowing**

John Wilson of Norval was awarded the Robin Hood Flour Mills Ltd. trophy and \$20 first prize money Saturday, for plowing first at the annual Halton County Junior Plowing Match, held at the Fred Nurse farm, Seventh Line Esqueping, John and the second place finisher in the competition, Dwight May of R.R. 2, Hornby, will represent the County at the International Plowing Match at Caledon on October 10. This is the second year in a row that John has gained the right to represent the county.

Ray Montague of Jarvis, was the judge for the competition, which was divided into two classes. In the under 16 years of age class, Bryan Marshall of R.R. 4, Milton placed first with a mark of 74, claiming the \$20 first prize money. Verna Thompson of R.R. 6, Milton was second and won \$15. Ron Brander of R.R. 2, Norval was awarded the third prize of \$10 and Jim Dale of

R.R. 2, Milton gained the fourth prize money of \$5. In the second class, for plowers between the ages of 16 and 21, John Wilson was first with a combined mark of 160 1/2. Dwight May was second with a mark of 145, winning the \$15 for second place. Ken Robinson of Norval was third, winning \$10 with a mark of 135 and Don Brander of R.R. 2, Norval placed fourth in the over 16 years of age class and won \$5.

Judge Montague noted "although the soil is very dry, the youngsters are plowing pretty good furrows." The Match was supervised by J. A. Francis, Halton County's Agricultural representative.

**Fiberboard Cartons  
Designed for Butter**

Use of corrugated fiberboard butter boxes has been approved by the Dairy Products Division, Canada Department of Agriculture, and the boxes will now be acceptable for packaging butter purchased by the Agricultural Stabilization Board.

The boxes, however, must meet specifications set out by the division to ensure durability and resistance to moisture. The "specs" were drawn up following extensive tests in which the Dairy Products Division, Forest Products Laboratory and the paper box industry co-operated.

Like its wooden counterpart which will continue to be an acceptable package, the fiberboard box has a 56 pound capacity.

The new container not only provides a saving in original cost, but also in transportation charges because of its lighter weight.
