With the game going into extra innings Bayliss bagged his homer to end the game.

# County's Financial Outlook Bright 92% of Debenture Issue Sold in Week

Halton County's financial picture looks rosy and a report from a bond house read at a special meeting of the County Council last Thursday proved the point. From the letter, it appeared investors were ready to snap up any county debentures. Nesbitt-Thompson bond house wrote council informing them they had placed 92 per cent of a \$450,000 bond issue, during the first week of offering, despite the fact the bond market has been under a great deal of stress during the past month. Seven Canadian insurance companies grabbed up the issue, and four of them had never purchased Halton debentures before. "We feel our success is due to the sound and credit-worthy nature of Halton County," the letter said. To which Warden C. A. Martin replied, "this certainly speaks well for the County's financial position." The debentures are to finance a 193bed addition to Oakville Trafalgar Memorial Hospital. They are for 20 years at 8.75 per cent per annum.

"Having gone to great lengths to publicize, as your idea, our informal agreement not to deface the streets of Halton with signs, I consider it a breach of faith that you were the first to do so," wrote Blake. He pointed out Kerr signs on Highway 2, the Quebec Line, and Highway 25 near Acton. "The residents of Halton will express their indignation at the path for the poster war you have precipitated. 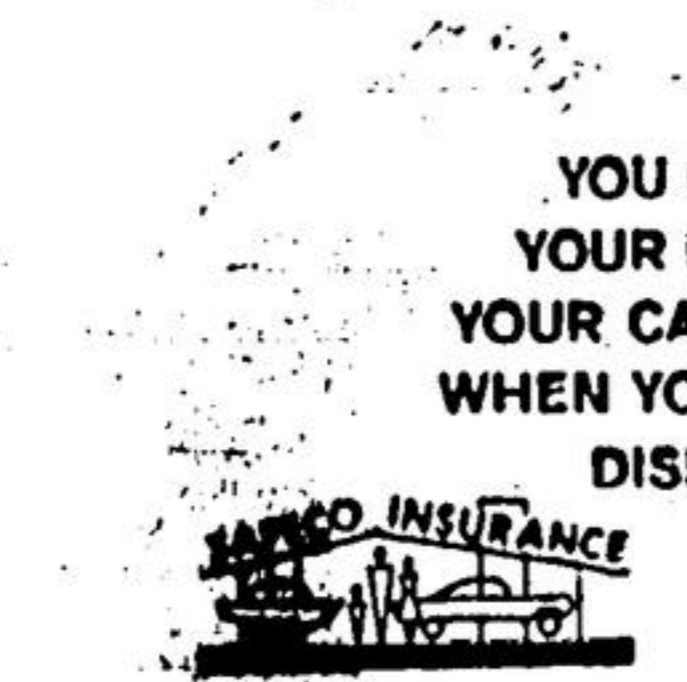
## Swim Test Later At Indoor Pool

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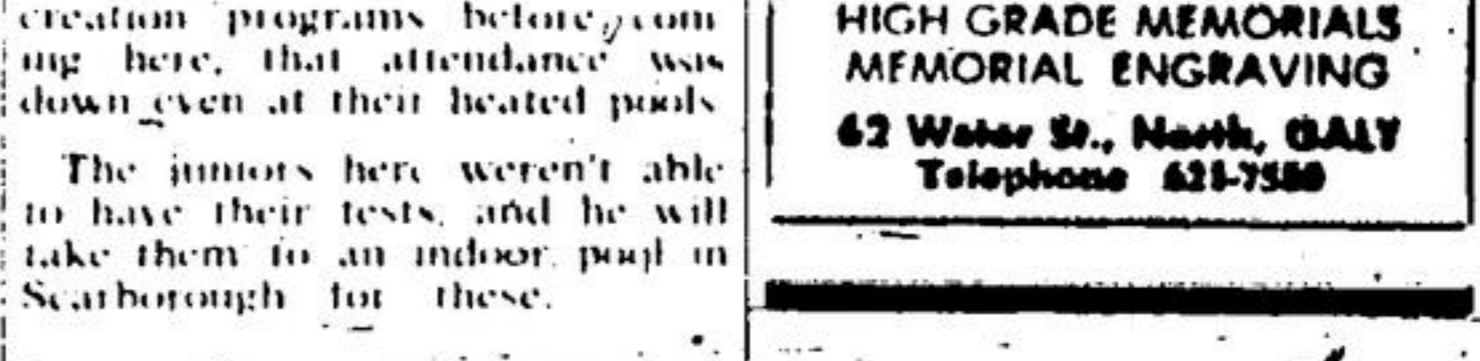
# Legion Racks Up Win In Semi-Final Series
