HARLEY...to HALTON

I am pleased that the resolution to set up the Canada Pension Plan has been introduced. This has been introduced at this time so that the plan can be studied at the Federal-Provincial Conference on the 26th-27th July, 1963.

It will then be introduced in the Fall in Bill form for legislation. In the meantime, comments and suggestions from improvement in the plan are encouraged and welcome. The Bill should pass the House of Commons and the Senate sometime in the Fall, probably October or November.

No Tax Increase

As was said during the election campaign, the \$10 increase in old age pension will come out of contributions to the Canada Pension Plan. In this way, no increase in taxation will result, either from the \$10 increase in Old Age Pension or from the Pension Plan itself.

While the Pension Plan will not become active for some time while the regulations and registration are carried out, the \$10 increase in Old Age Pension will take place early in 1964.

The registration for the plan will be carried out by the Unemployment Insurance Commission offices in May, 1964, when their new books are issued. In this way, the administration costs should be kept to a minimum. We would expect contributions to be collected as at approximately October, 1964.

The pension will be related to earnings and contributions, and will take 10 years of contributions before a maximum pension will be received. The pension will be available at age 65 if wished, at a smaller amount.

The rate of contribution will be 2% of earnings per year. For wage or salary earners, the employer will be required to pay one-half of this contribution.

Contributions and benefits will be based on the first \$4,000 of earnings and this level will increase with any increase in average earnings. In this way, if prices, cost of living and average earnings go up, so will the pension go up proportionately. The cost of administration will come from the contributions.

Begin at 18

Contributions to the plan will begin at age 18 and carry on until the pension is received. Pensions will be approximately 30% of what a man has been earning. As far as widows and widowers, the pension available to the surviving member would be 60% of the benefit available to the couple.

Private pension plans may still function. Private plans now in effect will be adjusted to the Canada Pension Plan. In comparison with the United States scheme now in effect, the Canada Pension Plan will pay somewhat higher benefits.

We are pleased to support a very worthwhile form of legislation to allow retirement with dignity and comfort.

Acton St. John Brigade on Duty One Hospitalized During Steam Show

The St. John Ambulance Brigade of Acton was "on duty" all weekend at the Ontario Steam Reunion held Friday to Monday, Labor Day weekend, at Milton Fair Grounds.

Despite a crowd of 27,000 and hundreds of pieces of heavy machinery moving around the fair grounds, they had only one serious accident to report. Jan Langedyk, a seven-year-old Given Rd. E. boy from Milton, fell while attempting to climb onto a hay wagon drawn by a steam engine. The rear wheels of the wagon passed over him.

Witnesses rushed the boy to the St. John trailer, where Superintendent George Hargrave and Fred Pooley placed him in a waiting ambulance and rushed him to Milton District Hospital. X-rays

showed no broken bones but hospital officials kept him in for a few days under observation.

Otherwise, they had a few bee stings, minor cuts and scratches to treat. Oddy enough, only one man required treatment for steam burns, and these were not serious. There were no cases of sunburn reported.

The St. John Brigade had a total attendance of 13 adult officials and 14 girl cadets on duty during the three-day show.
