Church Fall, Mourners Outside For Weeks' Funeral on Tuesday

A Guelph man and his wife, well-known in this district, were killed instantly and two others injured Saturday evening in a tragic two-car crash at Bruce-dale on No. 24 highway, three miles west of Rockwood. Dead are Mr. and Mrs. Albert L. Weeks and injured are Walter White of Galt and a passenger, Glen Schenk of Guelph. Mr. White, driver of a south-bound vehicle, suffered a fractured skull and underwent surgery Saturday night. Mr. Schenk was hospitalized in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, for observation. According to the investigating officer Robert Mackesney of the Guelph O.P.P. Detachment, the Weeks car was travelling north on 24 highway and was making a left hand turn into Stratton's garage and general store when the White vehicle struck it broad-side, killing the two occupants instantly. The constable said Mr. Schenk had been involved in a minor accident at Ostridge earlier when his car rolled over after striking guard rails and Mr. White was either taking him home or to hospital at the time of the fatality.

Weeks of Hillsburgh, Mrs. Weeks will be sadly missed by her mother, Mrs. Flora Grieve of Hillsburgh and a brother, Norman A. McKenzie of Ostridge. A few weeks ago friends and neighbors in the Acton district held a farewell party for the Weeks family before they moved to Guelph. Mr. Weeks was born in Guernsey Island off the coast of France and came to Canada at the age of two where he settled with his family in Orton. His father, who is a retired baker, lives in Hillsburgh. Mr. and Mrs. Weeks met in Hillsburgh and were married at the Church of Christ Disciples, Everton. After their marriage they farmed near Orton and during last winter sold their farm. Three weeks ago they moved to their new home on Olive St., Guelph. Mrs. Weeks was born above Ostridge on the farm still owned by her brother.

Funeral Tuesday
Funeral service was held Tuesday at St. John's United Church, Orton, and the overflowed mourners listened to the service through loudspeakers placed on the lawn. Mr. Gordon Williams, church minister, assisted by Rev. K. McLeod, pastor at Trinity United Church, Guelph, conducted the service. HALTON ELECTION ROUNDUP

Over 200 Consume Hamburgs

Wednesday evening over 200 enjoyed an outdoor barbecue of hamburgers and coffee at the home of local Conservative president Roy Kirkness and heard Halton Conservative candidate George Kerr make his last pre-election speech in Acton prior to the provincial election next Wednesday. Crowds began to gather shortly after 6 p.m. and hamburgers began to sizzle on the large barbecue as chefs were kept busy heating buns and cooking. Mr. Kerr and his wife mingled with the

guests and greeted everyone as they arrived. After the barbecue many of the people drove to Brookville hall to attend the dance sponsored by the Nassagaweya Conservative Association. Following this, Mr. and Mrs. Kerr spent the night with Mr. and Mrs. Tom Watson and he was up at six this morning (Thursday) to meet workers as they entered the tannery gates. He visited other industries this morning.

59,697 Eligible Voters

Election lists printed and posted throughout Halton's 283 polling subdivisions, show there are 59,697 eligible voters in the county for next Wednesday's provincial election. Court of Revision sittings were held over the weekend, and it is expected that figure will climb slightly following the addition of any voter who may have been missed by enumerators. Last week, the three candidates officially entered their

names in the election race. Their agents filed official nomination papers with returning officer M. E. Kerr of Oakville, each bearing at least 100 names of qualified voters who act as nominees. Incidentally, if your name is missing from the voters' list and you missed the court of revision, you can still get a vote next Wednesday if you can prove your name appears on the present municipal list of the town or township in which you live.

No Three Candidate Meeting

No meet-the-candidates meetings are scheduled here before the September 25 election, but Halton's three political aspirants faced audiences together on Monday and Tuesday evenings of this week. Jaycees in Georgetown and Oakville sponsored the meetings, when large crowds turned out to hear Conservative George Kerr, Liberal Owen Mullin and

New Democrat Bill Gillies outline their parties' stands and personal opinions on Halton politics. In Georgetown Monday, questions from the floor asked candidates to give their promises about developing the Ninth Line from Georgetown to Highway 401, a topic of current concern to ratepayers there.
