(Continued from Page B2) card these two theories of class war and the abolition of private property, it would still be condemned as long as it retains the principles of denying the existence of a supernatural life; instead it continues to maintain that the universe and only happiness of man is found in the things of the earth. Democratic Socialism is, I believe, the solution to the dangers of both extremes (Individualism and True Socialism) in our society. Its policy is based on the belief that the foundation of a well-ordered human society must be the principle that every human being is a person, that is, his nature is endowed with intelligence and free will. By virtue of this, he has rights and duties of his own, flowing directly and simultaneously from his very nature, which are therefore universal, inalienable, and inalienable. These rights include, the right to life, to bodily integrity, and to the means which are necessary and suitable for the proper development of life. These are primary, food, clothing, shelter, rest, medical care, and the necessary social services. Therefore a human being also has the right to security in cases of sickness, inability to work, widowhood, old age, unemployment, in any case in which he is deprived of the means of subsistence through no fault of his own. It also includes the right to education, the right to be truthfully informed about public events, the right to worship God according to the dictates of one's own honest conscience. In the economic field, there are the rights to free initiative, the right to a job and proper working conditions, and a living wage. There is also the right to private property, subject of course to its inherent social duties, the right of assembly and association, the right to emigrate and immigrate, and political rights. Finally there is the right to protection of all these rights by law, a protection which should be efficacious, impartial and inspired by the true norms of justice. As to the protection of these rights, Democratic Socialism recognizes that the primary function of the state is to supervise, stimulate, coordinate and integrate the activities of its citizens. It accepts an established principle that government has a right and an obligation to do for its citizens what they cannot accomplish themselves, either individually or in groups. It also believes that it is of the essence of good government to watch over and regulate the economic and social activities of the citizens in a manner that is directed to the common good of all and assures each and every one his or her due share in the goods and services rendered. 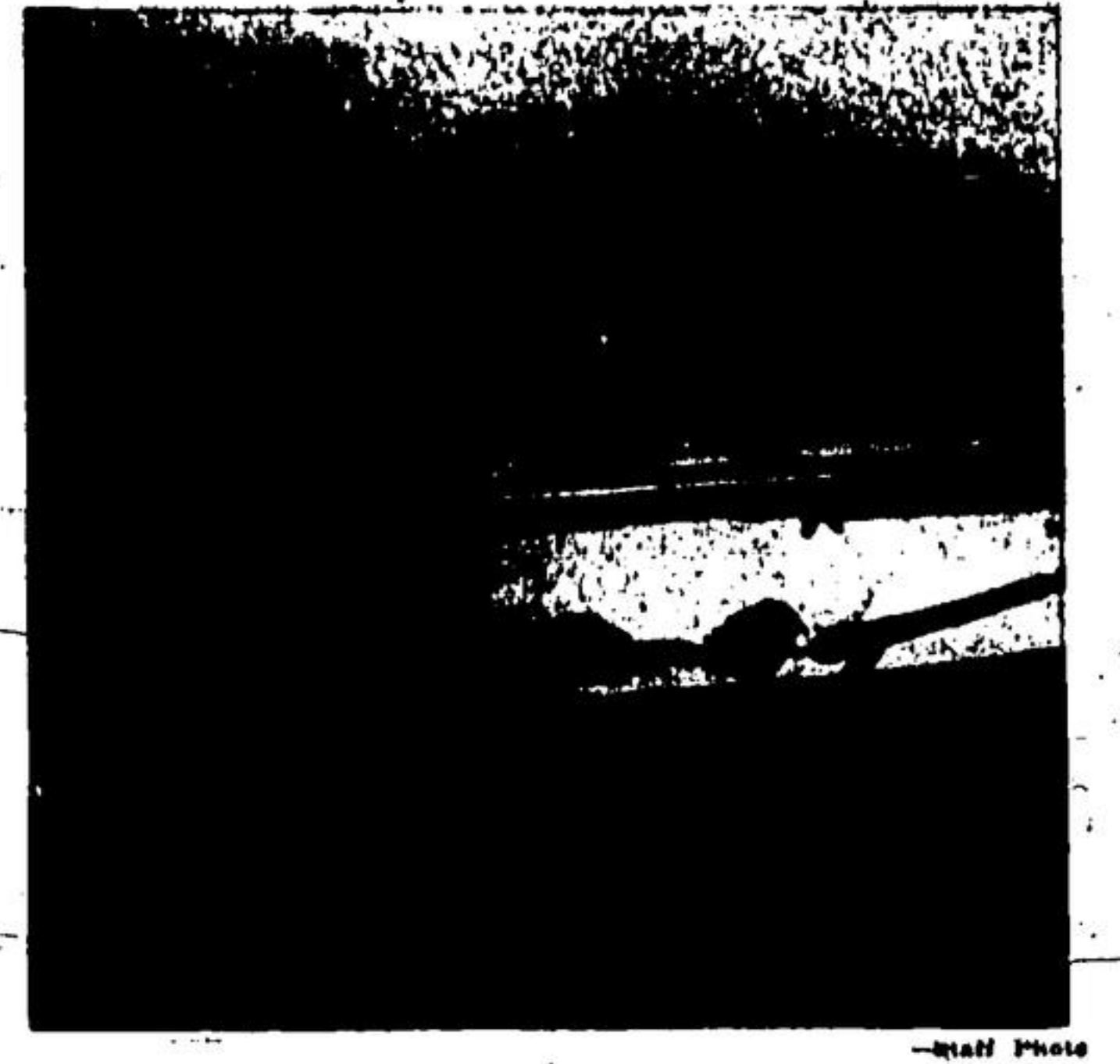
