

## Pounding the SPORTS BEAT

TWO GAMES HAVE 'GONE INTO THE books in the town softball league. Both played under the aegis of Helen Mills, and the Friday young Legionnaires have put a shaky Firefighters' team on the rim.

Last year's champions, the Firemen, dropped the first encounter for 4-2 Tuesday night were shut out 2-0 in a real pitcher's duel that saw little hitting but 30 batters going down on strikes. 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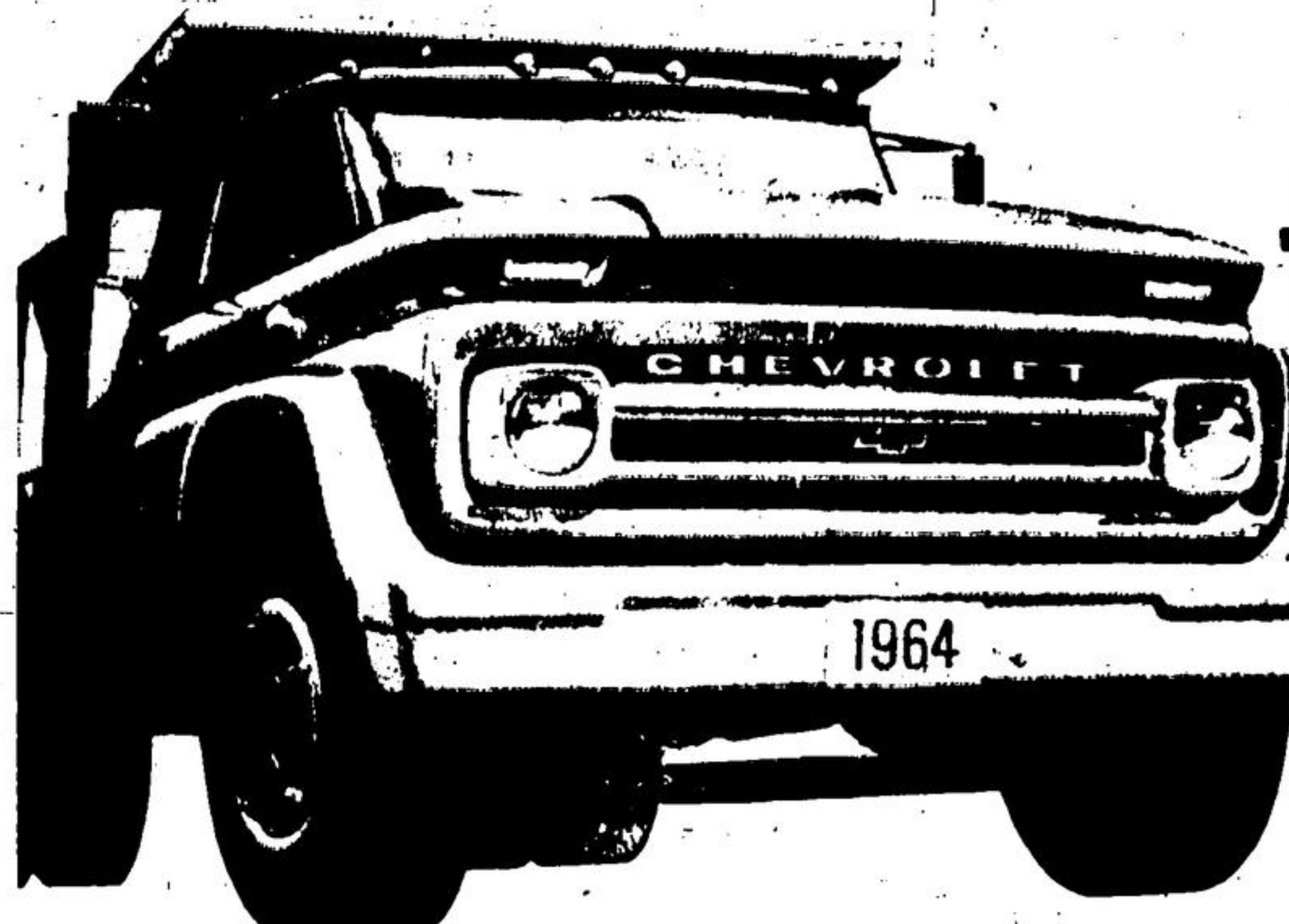
