

## Expanding Ratepayers Reject Board's Counter-Offer Friday

Expanding ratepayers living in the Milton school district Friday night rejected a counter-offer from the school board to move four of 12 specific pupils in question attending Milton Heights school. During a meeting the previous Tuesday the delegation demanded the 12 pupils be moved immediately to a graded school.

At the Tuesday, September 24 meeting the 13 ratepayers aired 22 grievances but their main concern was the transfer of the 12 pupils. At this time ratepayers were told it was impossible to reach a decision but a special meeting would be held Friday night at which time the board hoped to decide.

### Plenty Refuse

When ratepayers were notified at the Friday meeting the board would make certain pupils arrive at school 15 minutes before classes began as well as transfer four grade eight pupils to Stearnstown if a request was made they turned down the counter offer flatly.

During a board meeting Tuesday of this week no further action was taken by trustees on the ratepayers' problems.

## Believed Rabid Area Fox Shot

A sick fox—believed to be rabid—was shot last week on the Highway 25 farm of Stan Brown, after it caused widespread alarm in the district.

Observers reported it was probably the same fox that had fought with a dog at the nearby Clifford Brown farm a day earlier. Cliff Brown and his son Don hunted the fox, but failed to locate it. They shot the dog in case it had contacted the dreaded disease.

Wednesday of last week, a thin, sick-looking fox was seen in Stan Brown's laneway and Mr. Brown promptly killed the animal. They notified the Health of Animals Branch at Brampton, and were told to bury the animal.

It was the third instance of strange actions by foxes in this district. In the past two weeks, earlier, a fox attempted to attack a man, and another chased a car on the mountain west of Milton.

## Recalls Clearing Pine Forests W. J. Hampshire 91 on Saturday

W. J. Hampshire, R.R. 91, Milton, Saturday marked his 91st birthday.

Mr. Hampshire is a descendant of settlers who came to this country in 1803. He is a former township councillor, a former Halton Sheriff, and active church worker, a former school trustee, and federal election candidate, a one-time amateur boxer and a man who cleared virgin White Pine with teams of horses.

### Clears Forests

Mr. Hampshire was born at Fergus and at the age of seven months, his family moved to Speyside where his father had purchased a 200-acre farm. Ten acres of land had been cleared and the other 190 acres was covered with virgin White Pine. "It took a number of years to clear it," recalled Mr. Hampshire. "But I broke it all with a horse drawn plow."

He first went to Boston Presbyterian Church 89 years ago

and is the oldest living member. In 1935 he became Sheriff, Surrogate Court Registrar and Local Registrar of Deeds for Halton, a post he held until 1946.

A long time supporter of the Liberal Party, Mr. Hampshire was a candidate for the Federal seat in 1926 but he was beaten by Dr. R. K. Anderson of the Conservative party.

For many years he was president of the County Sunday School Association and he also served as president of the Canadian Club in Milton. Still in fine health, he visited Acton Fair two weeks ago.
