Architect, Delegation, Teachers Discuss Problems at Board Meet

Requesting school board members at a recent meeting discussed with architect Ed Barnett and his supervisor Ken Cameron final stages of completing details on the Limehouse school. Members queried some accounts to Lastracco Construction, construction for the school.

Mr. Barnett substantiated certain amounts and told the board Mr. Lastracco was willing to have the entire job completed as soon as possible in order to have final payments completed.

Principal Robert Gibbons from the Stewarttown school and Gary Davliss from Spencerville school representing teachers in the Esquimaux school area requested a change in teachers' monthly payment system.

Mr. Gibbons stated the present system was a burden to some teachers who had commitments to meet and suggested the board make the first salary payment the first week of September and the next payment before the end of the month. Each monthly payment thereafter was suggested to be made at the end of each month, with final settlement made before the end of the school term.

Mrs. Shirley Armstrong wondered why the teachers waited until this time of the month to request a change and Trustee Mac Sprawl suggested perhaps the teachers found it difficult to budget their money. The secretary was asked to attempt to comply with the request and have the next payment by the end of this week if possible.

Before the principals left the meeting, chairman R. J. Cunningham asked if they had any complaints and Mr. Gibbons remarked:

Neglect of Children Can Bring Two Years

For a compassionate community there can be no sadder news than the death by fire of children in the home. The shadow deepens when the headlines read, "We left them alone only for a few minutes."

For the stricken family, the shadow lasts a lifetime.

No child and no dependent person should ever be left alone. This is a vital message from Canada's fire services, not just for Fire Prevention Week but throughout the year.

There are various provincial penalties for careless neglect of children. And section 109 of the Criminal Code of Canada reads, "Everyone who unlawfully abandons or exposes a child who is under the age of 10 years, so that its life is or is likely to be endangered, or its health is or is likely to be permanently injured, is guilty of an indictable offence and is liable to imprisonment for two years."

Spokesman for the group, Trustee Bill Lawson suggested the board consider the same action for the Ligny school which has been closed and received the support of Mrs. Armstrong and Mr. Sprawl.

MY PLEDGE FOR FIRE SAFETY

- I pledge to remove fire hazards from my home daily.
- I will not kill by smoking in bed or being careless when I do smoke.
- I will not clean clothes or start fires with gasoline or other flammable liquids.
- I will not throw away matches without first being sure they are out.
- I will check my heating appliances and chimneys at regular intervals.
- I will not place hot ashes and coals in anything but a metal container and will not leave these containers sitting on a wooden floor.
- I will protect all woodwork... to smoke pipes with asbestos and metal, leaving an air space of at least two inches between this protection and the pipe.
- I will not do electrical wiring repairs unless I am a qualified electrician.
- I will not use pennies, hairpins, foil and such as electric fuses.
- I pledge to make Fire Prevention a year-round obligation by participating actively in the fight to reduce Canada's annual death toll by fire.
