Briefs Invited on the Subject of the Proposed MEDICAL SERVICES INSURANCE

The Government of Ontario has appointed an Enquiry which:

1. Having regard to the maintenance of the physical and material well-being of the people of Ontario, and the social, economic and health benefits to be achieved through the establishment and operation of a feasible medical services insurance programme, shall...
2. After due study and consideration, to make recommendations and report upon matters enquired into under the terms set out herein as the commissioners see fit to the Prime Minister and Executive Council of Ontario.

Notifications of intention to file briefs should be submitted on or before October 11th and actual briefs (25 copies) no later than November 15th to the Secretary.
