

Partnership in Gospel Plan In Progress at Three Churches

A partnership program which encourages members and adherents "to participate in their Christian responsibility" is underway at the Presbyterian, United and Anglican churches this month and next.

The three churches have already named committees which attend district meetings and are going about the program in only slightly varying ways.

The Anglican church is participating through the deanery and representatives of eight Anglican parishes are meeting in Barrie. There will be two general meetings in the parish hall later, the first October 30 with a film.

A re-organization of the parish may be a prime result of the partnership program at St. Alban's.

"1. To develop a better understanding of Christian stewardship.

"2. To create deeper concern for the whole work of the church.

"3. To encourage greater service on the part of the members.

"4. To study the Scriptural teaching on the meaning of Christian stewardship.

"5. To develop an active stewardship committee in every congregation.

"Every member's support and willing co-operation in time, ability and means is necessary to develop a Christian attitude in the congregation."

The **Committee**

At Knox, chairman is Lorne Dobertin, Murray Scoyne heads publicity, Vic Patrick heads the vision committee, Charles Kirkness the contact committee and Mac Sproul the special events committee.

At the United church Bill Morrison is chairman, Derek Milnes is publicity chairman; Bob Hart heads the vision committee, Fred Gordon the contact committee and Orville Brown the special events committee.

At St. Alban's

In the next two weeks members of St. Alban's Church will be receiving several more letters concerning the partnership program being conducted in the parish.

This program is headed by a committee under the chairmanship of John Goy and consisting of Bill Sproul, Herb Hardy, George Lee and Mrs. Grace Nelson and the rector, the Rev. D. H. West.

This program is not Sector, nor is it a parish visitation, and not an effort to raise money at St. Alban's, Mr. West says. The first phase of the program is an effort to enlist the support of a large number of families in an attempt to assess and evaluate the potential of the parish in terms of its pastoral outreach and efficiency.

Commitments

At the Presbyterian and United churches, understanding of Christian fellowship and its resultant deeper concern for the whole work of the church is expected to result in commitments, both material and spiritual. Those participating hope that "the giving of time, self and money for the spreading of the Gospel will be a privilege rather than, as it so often is, an unwilling commitment."

Scriptural teachings on the meaning of stewardship will be reviewed and the area of the church's responsibility will be studied.

Many families are being challenged to greater understanding and sympathy with the church-wide responsibility of the church.

Working Committees

From this very large "key committee" at each of the churches, will be chosen four smaller working committees — publicity, special events, vision and contact.

Letters have been sent to church members and more information will follow.

Dedication Sunday follows this detailed planning and unusually wide participation.

Explains Purpose

One of the letters recently in the mail explains the purpose of the partnership plan this way:

"The following five points are the basic goals of the partnership program:

Fred Nurse Places Third In Zone Pasture Contest

Fred Nurse, Georgetown R. R. 2, placed third in the South Central Ontario Pasture Contest. The competition includes the county winners in Oxford, Wentworth, Haldimand, Norfolk, Halton, Welland and Brant counties.

Mr. Nurse was selected by J. Norman Bird, the judge of Halton's competition, to represent the county in the zone competition. The zone scoring was judged by Howard Henry, Field Crops Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture. The zone winner was Fred Cohoe of Oxford County, and the runner-up was Orval Sinclair of Brant County.

The pasture management program carried out by Fred Nurse stresses carrying capacity and quality production. Halton is predominantly a livestock producing county and pasture production is the most important crop grown.

Murray Fisher of Burlington was named chairman of the Halton National Institute for the Blind Thursday, October 17, when over thirty attended the annual meeting of Halton's Advisory Board, in Knox Presbyterian Church, Milton.

Glorious History of the Lorne Scots

This is the seventh in a series of articles dealing with the history of the Lorne Scots.

THE DEFENCE PLATOONS SERVING IN CANADA

No. 8 Defence and Employment Platoon for service with the 6th Canadian Division was mobilized under the command of Lt. Col. L. H. Bertram, of Brampton, consisting of one officer and 60 other ranks.

The men were placed on subsistence, 137 O.R.'s were sent to No. 29 Canadian Army Training Centre for training, the remainder moved to Camp Niagara on June 24, 1942, at total strength of 137 O.R.'s. Basic training personnel were posted to 13, 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18 Defence platoons on July 17.

On September 10, one officer and 28 O.R.'s proceeded to divisional headquarters, Work Point barracks, Victoria. Lt. John Bertram assumed command on October 17. A total strength of 48 all ranks was reported in January, 1943. In May, the fully trained active personnel were transferred to the depot to proceed overseas.

On June 9, the National Resources Mobilization Act records were reviewed to complete establishment.

In July, Lt. J. H. Bertram was struck off strength and Lt. J. R. Wilkinson assumed command. In October, 1943, the unit was at Prince George, B.C. The unit was disbanded January 16, 1945.

No. 8 Defence and Employment Platoon for the 8th Canadian Division was authorized on June 15, 1942, at Camp Niagara. Lorne Scots personnel under Lt. Col. L. H. Bertram, Lt. Gowans and nine NCO's moved to Jasper with authority to mobilize the platoon on September 11. On October 15, 21 untrained other ranks arrived and commenced training. On November 14, headquarters moved to Prince George. On February 8, 1944, men came in to complete the establishment of 80 O.R.'s. Patigues were seriously intergrading with basic training. On September 21, Lt. G. C. Gardiner, the permanent O.C. of the unit, joined on October 15, 1945, the unit was disbanded.

Moved to Nanaimo

No. 13 Defence Platoon was authorized March 18, 1942 and mobilized at Camp Niagara in July. It was moved to Nanaimo, B.C. on May 12, 1943, in command and commenced training. Lt. G. C. Gardiner, the permanent O.C. of the unit, joined on October 15, 1945, the unit was disbanded.

No. 14 Ground Defence Platoon was authorized March 18, 1942 and mobilized July 17, 1942, at Camp Niagara and commenced training with No. 6 Defence Platoon. On November 12, the platoon was moved to Terrace, B.C. On May 12, 1943, the platoon again moved to Fort George for combined operations with the 16th Brigade Platoon and the 8th Division Platoon. In July, with brigade headquarters, the unit trained at Wainwright, Alberta. In 1944, the platoon moved to Nanaimo and disbanded January 31, 1945.

No. 16 Defence Platoon was authorized May 12, 1942, and was formed from Lorne Scots personnel at Camp Niagara, July 16, 1942. Under 2nd Lt. A. W. Cooper, the unit moved to Prince George on January 12, 1943. In June, it was brought up to strength by transferring men from No. 8 and 14 platoons. After training in the use of assault boats, the unit was disbanded October 15, 1943.

No. 17 Platoon was authorized on May 12, 1942, and disbanded November 15, 1943.

Disbanded in 1943

No. 18 Platoon was authorized on May 12, 1942. In September, it

was moved to Nanaimo. In February, the unit was brought up to strength with National Resources Mobilization Act recruits. The unit was disbanded October 15, 1943.

No. 19 Defence Platoon was authorized August 1, 1942 and mobilized at Camp Niagara. In January, 1943, the platoon left for Fort George and was brought up to strength with National Resources Mobilization Act recruits on February 1, 1943. The platoon was disbanded October 15, 1943.

No. 20 Defence Platoon was authorized August 1, 1942. The 2nd Battalion Lorne Scots were to provide the NCO's. The platoon was moved to Fort George, B.C. on February 6, 1943. The platoon received 12 recruits from 26 Canadian Army Basic Training Centres. In March, the platoon moved east to Camp Val Cartier and Debert, N.S., on April 6. In July, 1943, the platoon was disbanded October 15, 1943.

No. 21 Defence Platoon was authorized August 1, 1942. On March 1, 1943, CSM Street and Cpls. Hunter, Gravelly and O'Neil proceeded to Val Cartier and formed "21" which was already formed from French speaking personnel. Training was started and the unit was busy with guard duties and fatigue. The platoon was disbanded October 15, 1943.
