Everyday Life in Sudan Told By Missionary at Meeting

(Intended for last week)

The W.M.S. of Nassagaweya Presbyterian Church held their fall Thankoffering meeting on Thursday, October 3 in the church with representatives from Campbellville, Lowville, Rockwood, Acton and Ebenezer in attendance. Mrs. Thos. Manes was organist and Mrs. Cox, the president, lead the service of worship. Mrs. Velma Norris introduced the guest speaker, Miss Elsie Lavery of Hamilton, a missionary on furlough from the Sudan Mission field in Nigeria. She is a Bible teacher.

She says the missionaries live an ordinary life like the people at home, washing, cooking and every day chores. She had a number of colored slides of the country and their classes, showing the work they are doing there. It is a very dry country and the animals pasture and wander around the compound even to the door of the dwellings. There are a lot of peanuts grown and these are ground to make oil. Often the shells as well as straw are used for making mud bricks to build with. Miss Lavery said they grow good squash and cucumbers, etc. Also gourds—these they dry and use for bowls. They also have some orange, lemon, and grapefruit trees. Their fences and a lot of pots.
