### 100,000 Visit Halton Plow Match Display

The "tremendous success" of Halton's display at the International Plowing Match at Calcutta, that attracted 100,000 visitors to the county tent, was outlined to members of Halton County Council at their meeting on Wednesday.

Official host Jack Armstrong, Georgetown, reported many favorable comments on the county display and one call indicating the interest of an industry in buying a plow in Halton. He reported the inquiry was speedily dealt with through the E.M.O. communication set up to the county building in Milton. Through this the

required information was sent to the firm the day the request was received.

"We've got a selling job to do. This was an important effort," he suggested advising the county to participate with displays in other similar types of event.

Mr. Armstrong praised the quality of the exhibits, stressed the need for action in displays, and noted packages of matches distributed had gone to South Africa, United States and Australia to name a few of the places.

The county approved a motion, sponsored by Deputy Reeve A. Phillips, Oakville praising the efforts of the industrial committee in organizing the display and those who manned the displays during the event.

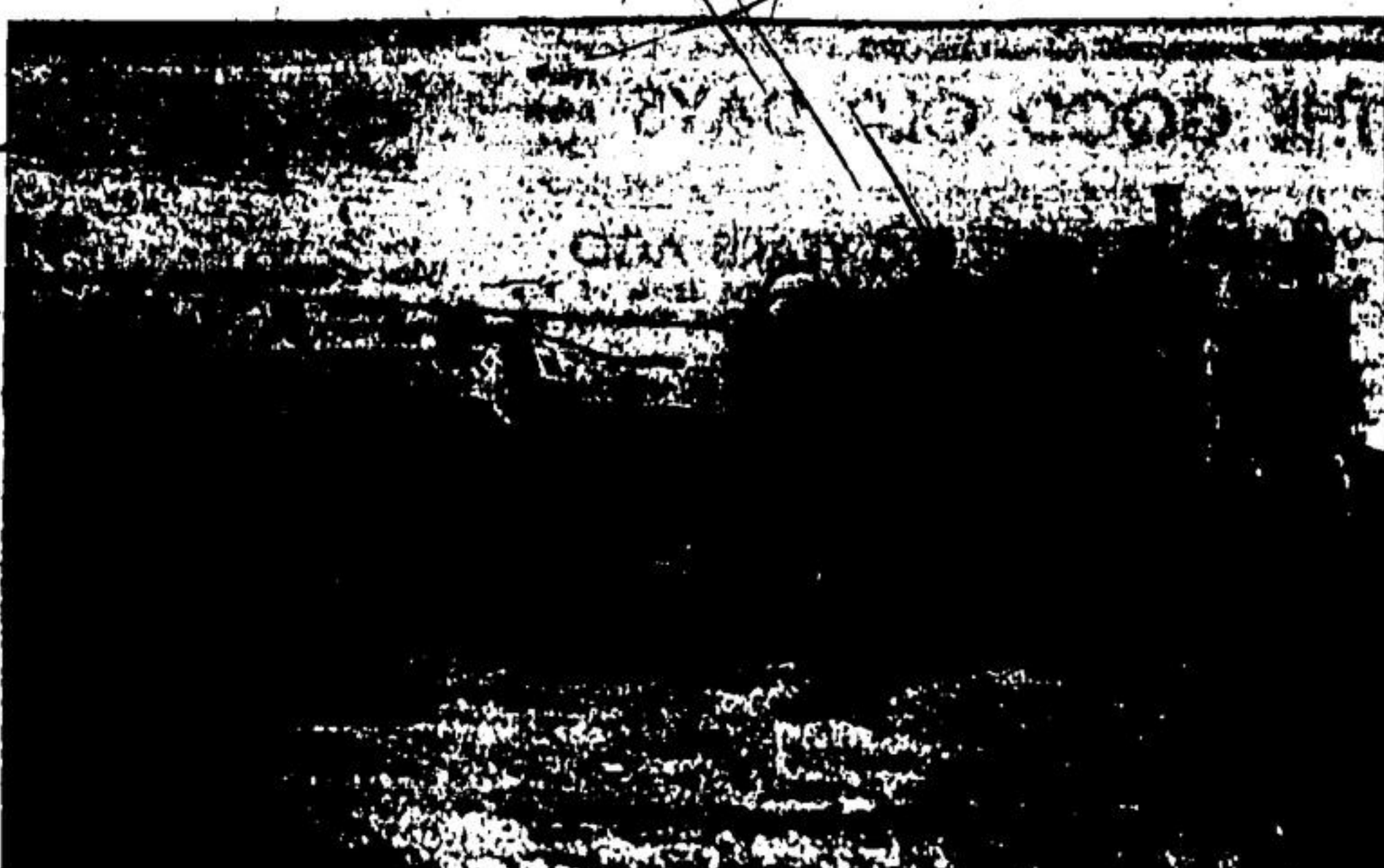

### Glorious Record of Lorne Scots

This is the eighth in a series of articles dealing with the history of the Lorne Scots.

#### SHEPHERD PARK TRAINING CAMP

The Lorne Scot Training Battalion, under command of Lt. Col. T. E. Snow, Royal Canadian Regiment, and Major W. R. Lenz, 2 J/C, assembled at Shepherd Park, East Surrey, England and formed into six companies of four platoons each, numbered 1 to 24, on June 6, 1942.

Over 900 from all ranks marched into camp, but with additional reinforcements, over 1,250 of all ranks were on strength at the end of the concentration.

A company was formed from 1st Army Defence Coy., under Capt. V. G. H. Phillips, officers: Capt. J. W. Drennan, Lt. T. Anderson, Lt. R. B. Cole, Lt. J. Robb, Lt. D. H. Andrews and Lt. R. R. Kelly. B. Coy. was formed from 1st Can. Corp. Defence Coy., commanded by Maj. F. H. Chisholm, with Capt. M. T. McAlpine, Lt. C. W. Darling, Lt. J. M. Conover, Lt. D. A. Reid, Lt. S. R. Charters, Lt. W. Burden and Lt. E. J. Lawrence.

C Coy. was formed from the four platoons of 1st Canadian Division, commanded by Maj. E. G. Pullen, with Maj. W. O. Stockdale, Lt. C. F. Richardson, Lt. S. T. Strath, Lt. S. Beatty, Lt. C. D. Beatty and Lt. K. C. Campkin. D Coy. was commanded by Major H. G. Peacock with Capt. J. M. Burgess, Lt. E. W. Dodd, Lt. P. B. Barber, Lt. E. J. Norris, Lt. R. C. Richards, Lt. E. Coy. was commanded by

Lt. M. J. Gray were posted to companies.

Also attending were Lt. J. R. Black, Lt. E. D. Gauderham, Lt. E. W. Ward, Lt. R. L. Goddard, Lt. C. W. Armstrong, Acting Capt. and Adjutant, Lt. C. M. Bennett, Lt. W. Lang and Lt. W. Leach. RSM Brown of the Scots Guards was attached as RSM.

The training consisted of drill, route marches, cross-country running, range practices and guard mounting. The battalion was inspected by various personnel including Lt. Gen. B. I. Montgomery, General Officer Commanding, South Eastern Command. The unit dispersed July 13, 1942.

Canada supplied a division for the allied forces of occupation in Germany after the armistice. The third division was chosen and the Lorne Scots were authorized to form the defence platoons for the 27th, 28th and 29th brigades on June 16, 1945.

The remainder of the Canadian Army was demobilized. Personnel were moved from unit to unit in order that the older cadres might be returned home first. As transport became available, Canada's army was gradually broken up, transported home, and the personnel discharged.

The defence platoons were disbanded, the 27th platoon on April 4, 1946, the 28th on May 14, 1946 and finally the 29th on June 16, 1946. Lorne Scots personnel had served with distinction in North Africa, Sicily, Italy, and throughout Europe from D-Day, May 6, 1942, to the occupation of Germany. A large number of officers served in various staff appointments and training establishments in Canada, England and Continental Europe.
