

Objections Holding Up New Road to Terra Cotta Park

Caledon Township is the fly in the ointment holding up construction of a new straight road to the Terra Cotta park, the Credit Valley Conservation Authority learned Thursday when Georgetown Deputy-Reeve W. F. Hunter requested the road.

Best Site Location
Caledon objected to the location approved by the Department of Highways — and the only location for which they would give their generous 80 per cent subsidy — Chingacousy Reeve Cyril Clark told CVCA members at Terra Cotta, Thursday.

Caledon wants the road run through to No. 24 Highway, while the Department's financial assistance is conditional upon the road following the town line to No. 34 Sideroad and the Fourth Line.

Bridge to Nowhere
"Caledon Township built a tremendous bridge on the South Line in anticipation of the road. What are we going to do with it now?" asked CVCA representative for Caledon, J. S. Scott.

"I can assure you, there'll be no money spent on that trail," the outspoken Chingacousy Reeve Clark said, referring to the existing track from Terra Cotta. "You had an opportunity to get a good road."

A committee to "promote the establishment of a road to serve Terra Cotta" was formed. Members are CVCA Chairman Roy McMillan, Reeve Clark, Chingacousy CVCA representative Frank Lyons, requesting CVCA member Wilfrid Leslie and a representative from Erin Township.

The road would cost about \$70,000 a mile, Reeve Clark said. The 20 per cent paid by adjacent municipalities.

Motherless Child Led Natives To Gospel, is Graduate Nurse

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HARLEY...to HALTON

The past week in the House of Commons has been occupied with two main subjects: (1) Maritime Transportation Union Trusteehip and (2) a supply motion.

A supply motion is debated for two days. It is permission for the Speaker to leave the Chair of the House of Commons so that the Committee of the House can consider detailed estimates of Government spending in each department of Government.

Can Talk Two Days
What this means, really, is that for two days the Opposition can talk 'til' a subject is chosen and at the end of the two days, can vote "no confidence in the Government" in regard to this and cause a vote to be taken. A second party, in order of their sitting in the House of Commons, can move an amendment to this non-confidence motion, this usually causing two votes rather than one vote, as a separate vote is necessary on both the non-confidence motion and any amendment.

On this occasion, the opposition based its motion on a failure to help the eastern farmer. The Social Credit Party amended this to read that this was because the Liberal Government had continued the same policies as the previous Conservative Government. As expected, the Government survived the votes. A loss in a non-confidence motion by the Government would automatically mean another election.

Set Up Trusteehip
The legislation setting up the Maritime Transportation Union Trusteehip has passed the House of Commons. It will be discussed in the Senate on Wednesday and is liable to receive Royal Assent Wednesday night.

For the legislation to be effective, we must have the active cooperation of the union members. As well, we shall expect cooperation with the United States when Canadian ships, manned by members of the unions that will be taken over, dock in U.S. ports. A great deal of trouble could be caused if the U.S. unions tried to obstruct loading of these ships.

As I have mentioned previously, the Post Office Department has been investigating, at my request, mail delivery in many areas of the Riding. I am pleased that Rancilffe Road and Palgrave and Castlegreen subdivisions in Oakville will receive door-to-door mail delivery as soon as staff is available and 80 per cent of the homes have mail receptacles.

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
