## Bruce Andrews Burning Up Yank Tracks

South Orange, N.J.—Bruce Andrews of Acton, and Tom Tushingham, his fellow Canadian from Whiteby, will be key factors when Seton Hall University defends its Metropolitan Interscholastic Cross Country title at Van Cortland Park, New York City.

Tushingham, a junior, helped the Hall win last year along with returnees George Gormann, Captain Kevin Hennessy and Joe Knox. At the same time, Andrews was starting with the French and climaxed a great season by winning the coveted ICAA track championship.

Andrews has been just as brilliant with the variety this fall in the Pirates' first six meets. He won three and finished third the same number of times.

One of the finest races of his career came last Saturday in the meet with Rutgers. Running in 84 degree heat, made worse by intense humidity and smog, he won by a 100 yards from his mate, George Gormann.

An example of the adverse conditions that day can be seen by the fact that his sixth running mate, Herb Gormann, and he ran almost even until the weather turned with 400 yards to go. The finish line, Captain Hennessy was also affected by the heat and was fortunate to finish ninth. Thus, what looked like an easy victory most of the race turned into a tough 27-38 setback.

Tushingham has been running very steadily. His chart shows the following finishes: 6-13-3-6-4.

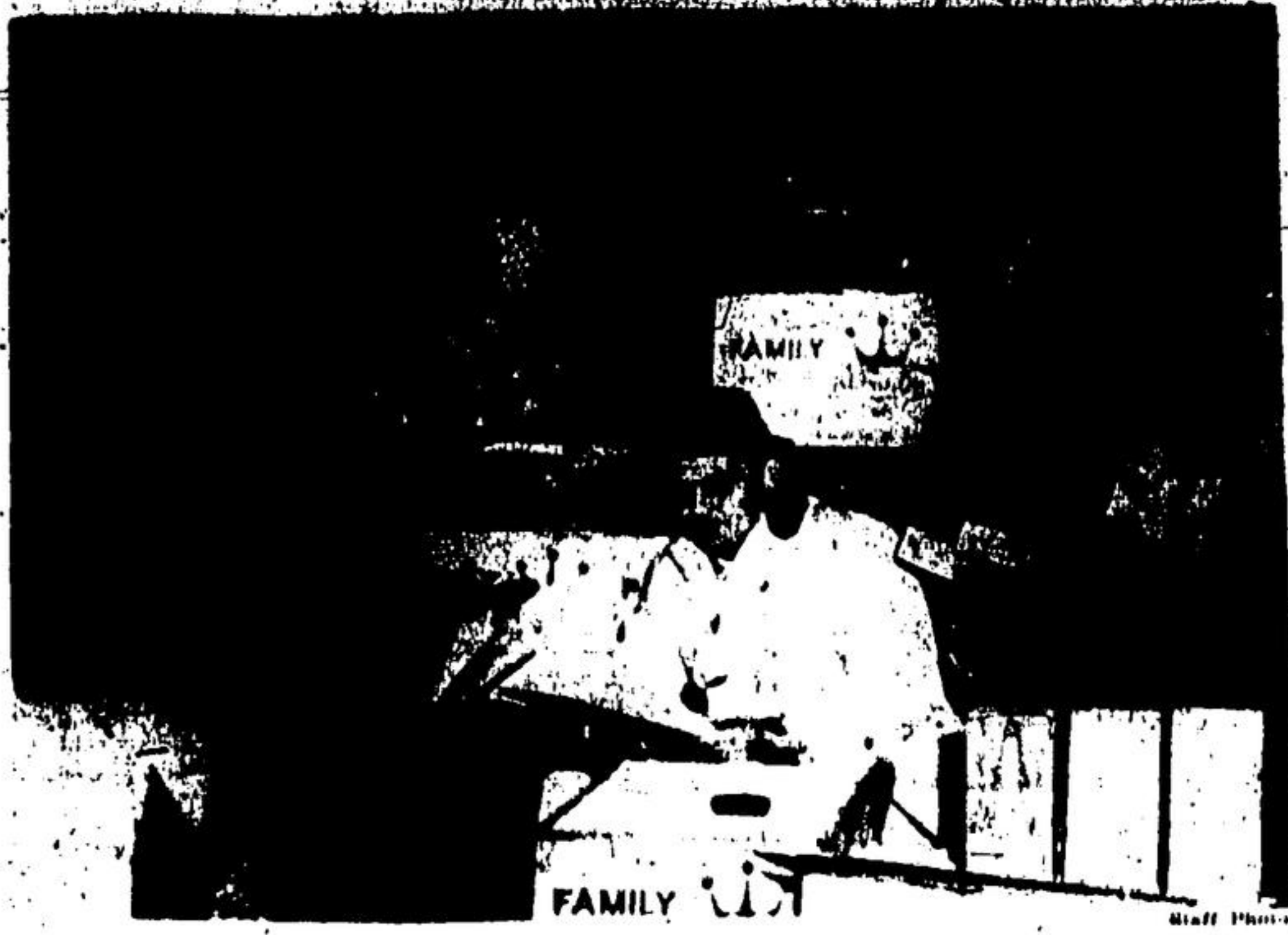
## First Practice For Tanners Friday Night
